I didn't actually remember entering a giveaway to receive this book before, but it was good to get to read one of the many books that are on my 'want-to-read' list.

This book didn't irritate me like so many young adult books have been doing. It was easy to read with fairly likable characters - and a romance that wasn't the main focus of the story. I was surprised to find that I actually did like Bryony - and it was good to see a main character who wasn't described as being incredibly beautiful every other paragraph.

I liked the relationships between the other characters, but I wasn't too keen on the cliched, 'Oh, I know he likes you too'. That did get old very quickly. Luckily, it wasn't a constant thing - but I rolled my eyes every time I read it, simply because it's *so* overused.

I really did like the illustrations at the beginning of each chapter. I did notice some grammatical errors - and once or twice, there was an abrupt POV shift in the space of a paragraph. One of those then skipped back in time, without any scene break, and that tends to leave me feeling quite dizzy.

I did get a bit confused about who was related to who and had to keep checking back with the family tree, which turned out to be quite useful. I also found it a bit difficult to keep track of all the different characters and who was in a relationship and who wasn't.

I was quite surprised to discover Bryony was only seventeen, because she did come across as fairly mature. Whether that was due to the setting or other factors, I couldn't say. Also, despite the huge amount of characters, I did find this book fairly easy to understand, despite it being the third (and last) book in the series.

I was glad to see that battle wasn't glorified very much in the book - and that it did come across as true battle, rather than the good guys storming through the bad guys. I wasn't surprised by the scene towards the end - but I do think that, with all of the seasoned fighters on the field, surely they should know that you shouldn't count an enemy dead unless you actually see his body.

All told, this book was a fairly quick, enjoyable read. I can't say when, but at some point, I would be interested to see how it all began and read the previous two books.
