



Samson: A Savior Will Rise

The year is 1941, and Samson Abrams makes a life-or-death decision that lands him, and his entire family, in the notorious concentration camp Auschwitz. When Samson is recognized by Dr. Josef Mengele and Commandant Rudolf Höss as a former boxing champion, he is ordered box for their entertainment. A win means extra rations, but the penalty for losing is death in the gas chambers.

One question haunts Samson as he and his family face one atrocity after another: Where is God in the face of such evil? An unexpected friendship between the Jewish Samson and the Polish Catholic priest Maximilian Kolbe challenges Samson to examine what little is left of his faith, but will it give him strength when he needs it most?

Samson: A Savior Will Rise gives us faces and names and personalities of a Jewish family in the Krakow Ghetto.

Abraham and Hannah, the aged patriarch and matriarch. They were frail in body yet strong in spirit.

Samson, the eldest son, the prizefighter who should have competed in the 1936 Olympics.

His wife, Rebecca, beautiful even though she's slowly being starved to death, with part of her radiance coming from the new life she carries in her womb.

Their other three children, Simon and Leah and Rachel. The boy played classical violin with as much skill as a man twice his age, and the twin girls shed joy and laughter everywhere.

Samson's brother Zach, slim, soft-spoken, scholarly and his love, Esther. The two of them planned to marry as soon as possible, and their hope was to be as happy as Samson and Rebecca.

Samson's sister, Sarah, and her baby Elijah. Sarah's husband had already been taken away.

All of them lived in one room, all of them dependent on Samson to bring their daily bread.

And then the day comes when Samson rescues a boy from Nazi brutality, breaking one officer's nose and snapping the other one's jaw. In retaliation, his whole family is sent to the camp, to Auschwitz.

And there Samson is offered a sadistic bargain that will either preserve his life or send him to his death.

A boxing match, the winner lives and receives extra food, the loser goes to the gas chambers.

And so Samson will enter the ring again, and he will send his opponent to his death to try to save his family.

And as Samson fought, unleashing his fury on his opponents, matching his muscle against the Nazis, he became a symbol for the whole camp. He became a symbol of renewed hope when it seemed insane to have hope... and he became a symbol of their faith.

He fought with the strength of a man preserving his own life and desperate to free his family, and he fought with a strength that couldn't all be his own. He was battered, broken, "held together with stitches at the seams." Yet somehow, every time he fell, he rose to fight again, and when he fought he won.

There are so many questions laid on your heart as you read.

The perverse, wicked things done to Samson's family...

How could the world have allowed that to happen?

How could "civilized" and "educated" people ever rationalized or condoned that depravity?

How could we forget the wickedness in the grossly fallen heart of man... how could we ever convince

ourselves that we are all basically good?

How, when this massive sin flourished a mere 70 years ago, how could we train children today that there is not absolute truth, no absolute definition of good and evil?

How could we forget?

During World War II, Jewish men were forced to box on Saturday night for Nazi entertainment. The winner got extra food. The loser went to the gas chambers. Shawn Hoffman took this aspect of the cruelties in Auschwitz-Birkenau, the stories, Saul, an Auschwitz survivor, told the author, and recent discoveries on the medical experiments Dr. Joseph Mengele did there to build his plot.

The Jewish Samson Abrams, 1936 Olympic boxing participant, made a life or death decision in 1940 in Polish Kraków rescuing a young Jewish boy beaten by the Nazis. That act costed him and his family much. He tried to escape the penalty (being brought to Auschwitz), but let the love for his dear ones prevail. They end up in the concentration camp, labored, digging mass graves and tried to survive. As soon Samson is recognized as the former boxer, lieutenant colonel Rudolf Höss offered Samson a deal: boxing matches on Saturday night. The loser will be sent to the gas chambers, the winner gets an additional share of food. Remarkably, Samson is stronger than all of his opponents. Maximilian Kolbe, a Catholic monk also at the

camp, is the one that calms down the anger and rage again and again. Don't blame God for the evil men does. The monk strongly testifies about his Christian motives to help the Jews and stand for justice amidst the greatest cruelties you can think of. Is there a God? Why do the Jews have to suffer all these? Who can you trust? Will human power prove the Jewish to be superior to the Aryan race? "Not by might or power, but by the Holy Spirit..." is the lesson from both Old Testament Samson as well as this 20th century giant, tormented by the ongoing murders on his family members.

Step by step you feel your anger grow, as injustice does. And where you feel that it's too coincidental to have Adolf Hitler, Heinrich Himmler, Höss, and the angel of Death Mengele show up in this same plot, Hoffman throws in additional rounds, changed rules, bruises and opponents. After a culminating fight with Max Schmeling even Mengele is challenged to get in the ring. Samson: a Savior Will Rise strikes nerves, even though foot notes and historical details may distract for a minute. A powerful work of historical fiction.

Shawn Hoffman's book "Samson," subtitled "A Savior Will Rise" is a fascinating novel exploring the bonds of family during the most horrific circumstances of World War II.

Samson Abrams and his family are imprisoned in the infamous concentration camp Auschwitz. When Commandant Rudolf Hoess recognizes him as a former Olympic champion boxer, Samson is forced to fight for the entertainment of the local Nazi officers. The deal offered to him: if he wins, he gets extra rations; but if he loses, he is sent to death in the gas chambers.

The book is billed as "based on true events." However, it is not strictly a historical work. This is more of a historical novel. Throughout the book, Hoffman inserts footnotes to document actual events that occurred, upon which he bases his story. The characters are, in the words of the book, "amalgamations."

With some artistic license being taken, Hoffman is free to create a dramatic story worthy of telling on the movie or TV screen. The author is an actor himself, as well as a screenwriter. The book has the feel of

having been written with the intent to market the story as a movie. The screenplay for "Samson" has won awards at film festivals.

The subject of the victims' plight is treated with the utmost respect by the author, who met with a survivor from Auschwitz and was told stories of his experiences there. Readers will appreciate both the suspenseful story, as well as the historical information being presented.

Depictions of the horrific conditions and torture of prisoners can make some squeamish, but the author does not want people to forget this part of history. Worse still, there are those that deny the Holocaust happened. Despite the unpleasant nature of the setting, stories like this need to be told so we can learn from the past, and avoid ever having something like this happen again. The author takes care to present the major points without dwelling on gory details.

Samson's fights in the ring offer hope to other prisoners who have none, and serve as an inspiration for those struggling with faith in God.

This is a suspenseful story that will keep readers turning pages to see what happens next. Fans of history, boxing, and stories of a man's love for his family, will enjoy this book.

With elements of fact and fiction blended together, perhaps the book should be called faction. Well blended and documented for the reader to know the difference between actual historical events and character driven drama, this book should not be missed.
