I grabbed this galley from Netgalley. I'm a huge fan of Harlequin books. I can't get enough of their authors. Love them and love their imprints too. You will never go wrong when you pick up any Harlequin book. So in "Soldier on her doorstep", Lisa receives an unexpected visit from a soldier. Now normally when military wives receives visit from soldiers, it's never good news. But she had already received THAT bad news almost eight months ago. So this visit was unexpected.

Alex promised his friend was died in his arms that he'll grant his last wish. Which was to take certain belongings to his widow and check up on them. Not really wanting to go but refusing to abandoned his promise. He finds himself at the doorstep of his comrades widow. Not being a man of many words made it difficult for him to express himself and explain to his friend's widow how sorry he was about her husband death.

Lisa seeing how much pain Alex himself was in, offered him to stay for dinner. She asked him questions and he replied in silence. But Lisa's little girl somehow understood his silence and reached out to him. Something she has not done since the news of her father's passing. Seeing how Alex and Lily responded to one another, Lisa invited Alex to stay at their cottage.

Lily opened up more to Alex and they bonded in ways that she did with her own dad. Alex managed to help Lily find her voice and open herself up in a way no one else has. And that tugged at Lisa's heart strings. A super fine sexy soldier holding hands with a tiny little girl was something that her heart couldn't ignore. The question now is would they proceed and give into raw emotions or will they let the memory of a deceased soldier get in the middle?

This is another line of Harlequin's that I hadn't tried before. I gather it's more of a kisses only line. I've really run the gamut when it comes to sensuality levels of books. I used to like the real hot oh so many years ago when I was reading the likes of Rosemary Rogers, Kathleen Woodiwiss, Jennifer Blake and the like. Then I was turned off romance for a number of years and when I came back, it was kisses only. Then I slowly entered the sensuality pond until I wouldn't read kisses only. Now I've completely confused the circle as I'm now reading and enjoying both. So despite the fact that there are no explicit sex scenes, in fact no real sex scenes at all, the author manages to convey a great deal of longing both the hero and heroine feel for each other.

My heart broke for Alex, the hero and I love when I experience that kind of feeling for either of the main characters. He's so alone and needs Lisa and her daughter Lilly so bad. And they need him too. His family

were killed when he was very young and he grew up in foster care. He has great feelings of guilt for both their death and the death of William, Lisa's soldier husband. He died saving Alex. Alex is following up on a promise he made to William and delivering some personal items to Lisa in Alaska. He has left the services and as the army was his family, he is at very loose ends. When Lisa picks up on this and offers to let him stay in a small cottage on her Alaskan lake property, he is reluctant but agrees anyway. He is drawn to her daughter Lily; understanding the loss Lily is feeling. He is also very attracted to Lisa.

And in return, Lisa is very attracted to Alex though she is torn between her growing feelings for him and the feelings she still has for William. To be honest, I was kind of wondering how I would feel about this as William hadn't been gone for that long. But the author wrote the story in such a way as it was very believable. William and Lisa hadn't spent much time together as he was so often deployed on missions. And both men are complete opposites of each other so there is no comparison between them. I truly bought how she could develop such deep feelings so quickly.

And with troops returning, I think it's a very timely book too. And I love the setting. As a heat hating reader going through a heat wave like I can't remember, somehow reading a story set in Alaska made me feel just a little bit cooler – that and the fact that I have my air conditioning set way lower than the hydro people want me too. I am a heat hating reader after all.

Are you tired of reading about snippy heroines? You know... the ones who argue for the sake of arguing and feel the need to kick every man's butt. Well, you don't find that type of woman in Soraya Lane's *Soldier on her Doorstep*.

You find a strong, quiet and caring woman. A healthy woman determined to raise her fatherless child. It's been several months since the heroine, Lisa's husband was killed in combat. He was her best friend before becoming her husband, lover and the father of her child. His death hurt, but he was a lifelong soldier. She was always aware of the danger he faced. He was gone most of the year, but that didn't make his death any less painful for Lisa or her daughter Lilly.

The hero, Alex, is the most damaged character in the story. He had no family or place to go, and guilt was destroying him. He is a lost, little boy trapped inside the body of a grown man. Don't take that wrong. He is not childish in any way, but he longs for a family and fights his belief that he is undeserving of happiness. Fulfilling a promise to Lisa's dead husband is the road to life for him.

In the past I've had issues with series romance stories because they seem to be the same stories set in different places. I didn't have any of those thoughts with *Soldier on her Doorstep*. I loved the characters and

was pleased to see them find love. There were no surprises in the story. What you see is what you get. I knew how the heroine would react to his big, world-changing news.

Some people might not like how predictable *Soldier on her Doorstep* is, but I relished it. It is a sweet, classic romance which teaches forgiveness and the healing power of love. The story is not for adrenaline junkies, or those who cannot believe a widow can find love less than a year after her husband's death. I didn't have any problems suspending belief. Lisa and his family knew what her deceased husband would have wanted. I imagine he sent the very damaged Alex to Lisa to be healed. I also think he knew Alex could be trusted with his wife and daughter.

If I had to summarize the book in one word, I'd say it is quiet. The characters are quiet, seeking their own counsel. The town they live in is quiet. The romance is a quiet, getting-to-know-you action. The conflict is a quiet, internal battle. What did you think about *Soldier on her Doorstep*?

With so many wars going on in the world today, this story theme is very relevant. This is a story of love and loss and coming to terms with life today. Ms. Lane has written a tastefully done story about a wounded warrior, Alex, who has learned to isolate himself and hold all emotion within. He's made himself a life in the service, but he's out of now and isn't sure what to do with himself anymore.

The heroine, Lisa, has pretty well adjusted to being a widow, but his appearance and the letters he brings from her husband stir her emotions back up again. She's not looking for a new man in her life yet, but when her daughter (who quit speaking when she found out her father had died) takes his hand to lead him out to look at the lake she can't help but feel her heart respond.

This author talks of these emotions and how long it takes to heal with the resonance of experience. Perhaps not her own, but Ms. Lane is familiar with how hearts hurt and how they heal.

As you read about Alex and Lisa adjusting to being around each other, you begin to see the goodness in both characters and how Lisa is careful in handling the man she is growing to love. She knows there is something in his past, but doesn't press him to talk about it. As she shares more with him, he finally begins to get more comfortable with her and shares a few things back.

The road to love is not easy, and when your potential partner is carrying some baggage, it's even a longer road to smooth sailing. This is a sweet, romantic story with some challenges for the characters that's well worth the read. Why not get a copy for yourself and see how it all turns out?

Soldier on Her Doorstep tells the story of the journey taken by a soldier who suffers from survivor's guilt, and how a man who has been a loner for most of his life suddenly finds himself feeling a wealth of emotions towards the widow of the man who took a bullet for him and died in his place. And how in the end he finds love, peace and happiness in the most unlikely of places.

When Alex Dane drives up to Brownswood Alaska, his only intention is to deliver a message to Lisa from her deceased husband and get the hell out. But when Alex feasts his eyes on the beautiful Lisa Kennedy and her 6 year old daughter Lilly Kennedy who hasn't spoken a word to anyone apart from her mother since being informed of the death of her father, something that has stayed long dormant inside of Alex till now stirs to life.

Lisa can't help but be drawn towards the silent and broody soldier that shows up on her doorstep looking as if its the last place he wants to be in. However, it is Lilly's instant connection with Alex that astonishes and pleases Lisa the most where Lilly and Alex form a strange bond right from the beginning which turns around Lilly's healing process from the trauma of losing her father.

The instant attraction between Lisa and Alex doesn't come without complications. Though Lisa in her mind is ready to accept that she feels something for Alex, her emotions wage an internal battle on whether it is the right thing for her to move on so quickly. And Alex would rather cut off an arm than give into his attraction towards the widow of the man who gave his life for him. Nevertheless, their attraction proves to be a more powerful drug than either of them could hope to resist and though they do give in to it, it is Alex's tormented soul that needs to heal before Alex and Lisa can have any real shot at happiness.

Soldier on Her Doorstep is a novel that has real good potential. I liked Alex and Lisa and Lilly as well, the 3 of them served to be endearing characters who lend the story a charm of their own making. I loved Lisa because she is someone whose character is strong enough to heal the very tortured soul of Alex who needs all the love and TLC in the world for him really put his demons to rest. Lilly makes for a very adorable character as well and I loved the descriptions that brought to life the connection between Alex and Lilly that serves as the healing point for Lilly's trauma.

However there were a couple of things that could have made this story better. The constant retelling and rehashing of what William (Lisa's husband) means to the budding relationship between Lisa and Alex gets a bit old after sometime. I would have loved to see more interactions between Alex and Lisa to witness firsthand how Alex heals from Lisa's love and care.

Lisa and William were friends turn lovers turn man & wife... They met as children, dated in high school, and shared their young adult lives together. While Lisa wrote cookbooks and raised their daughter, Lilly, William enlisted in the Army and was deployed overseas.

While overseas, William's team was assigned to a mission. While making their way back from their assignment, they came under fire by a sniper. William sacrificed his life, saving one of his men's. His dying words requested that the man he saved deliver his personal effects to his wife and to tell her to find happiness.

Now, Alex stands on Lisa's porch hoping to fulfill his promise to his friend and, hopefully, find some peace. He is haunted by a lifetime of demons and wants only to find some sliver of peace and solitude. What he doesn't realize, however, is solitude is the last thing he truly needs. He struggles with guilt and duty and ends up finding forgiveness and a home with Lisa and Lilly.

Lisa loved William with her entire heart and soul. When he died, she felt as though part of her died, as well. She knew her role as Lilly's mother, but she wasn't quite sure what else was expected of her. In her small Alaskan town, was she expected to live the rest of her life as a widow? Would finding a new love and a new partner betray William's memory? Fate delivers Alex to her doorstep, and the message he brings from William gives her the permission to live, laugh, and love again.

Overall, this was a very sweet story with very real characters who are dealing with tragic circumstances. Lisa, Lilly, Alex, and even William were crafted with such care; they truly did feel like tangible people versus written words. Adding to the empathy and the depth of the characters and story was the perspective of the story, told from both Lisa and Alex's POV.

The pace of *Soldier on Her Doorstep* was a nice, easy pace - not too quick, not too slow.

What makes this book a solid "liked it" versus a "really liked it" or "it was amazing" is just the simplicity or ease of the story. Though there was a catharsis for both Lisa and Alex, there was no climax or action. I don't believe there was meant to be a climax- the message of the novel centered around forgiveness.

The parallel between Lilly's problem and Alex's past was excellent. How fortuitous for both characters to come upon each other. It seemed almost like fate.

Also, I couldn't think of anything tougher personally than having to meet the dead ex's parents in the way Alex met William's parents. What a tower of strength you'd have to be to get through that encounter and it was certainly well done.

Finally, I loved the way Alex's job situation resolved itself with him becoming a park ranger. Maybe now he can convince Lisa to get a gun to defend herself and poor Lilly.

Seriously, a baseball bat versus a home intruder or a bear is not gonna cut it especially in a state where you don't need a permit to carry a concealed weapon. You are not always going to have the bear gently romp away.

When you have a heroine who was deeply in love with her husband and has been widowed for a matter of months, it can be tricky to have her fall in love again and make it believable. I did believe in Lisa's love for Alex by the end, and while she had her moments of missing William, the conflict she felt at falling in love with Alex felt very minimal. Which would have been fine but I couldn't help but think it had only been months since William died. Yes, he had been overseas for months prior to that but still...

Lisa Kennedy knew there could come a day when her husband William might not make it home. It still didn't make it any easier when she found out that William had been killed overseas while serving in the army. It's been months since his death and Lisa and her six year old daughter Lilly are trying to move on with their lives in Alaska. The way Lisa is portrayed you can tell she loved William very much and still does. But she understands that loving him doesn't mean she can't someday love another man. She's just not ready for it, instead concentrating on helping her daughter speak again. Lisa's reactions and thoughts were realistic for her situation but I was surprised at how quickly she fell for Alex. I did like that she's practical about it and I think that had to do with her being in love before and still believing in love. She could have become cynical and depressed but instead she continues to try to keep a positive outlook, if not for herself, then for Lilly.

Alex Dane is just passing through to fulfilling a promise. But instead of a quick stop, he ends up staying for a few weeks. Alex would be the last one to call himself a hero but that's what he becomes in the eyes of Lisa and Lilly. The way the relationship between Alex and Lilly developed was critical because there was no way Lisa would ever fall for a man that Lilly didn't trust or feel comfortable with. In creating that relationship Lane allows for Lisa to have a relationship with Alex. With both these relationships, Alex shows little bits and pieces of himself, letting Lisa, Lilly and the reader get to know this solitary man.

The romance is there but it takes a while to develop which makes sense since neither character is ready to jump in, feet first, to love. The problem is, for a short book (187 pages) it moved at nearly a snail's pace. I kept waiting for something, although I'm not sure what, to happen. There is some conflict from Lisa's family, specifically her sister, but it didn't play a large role in the story. Alex's feelings of guilt are lifted after a

serious talk with Lisa and Alex finally has a home to call his own.

Soldier on Her Doorstep was a sweet, if a bit slow, romance. The writing is easy to read even with what I thought might be regional terms but now I'm thinking they might be due to the fact that the author is from New Zealand. Whatever is the case, I'm looking forward to reading more from Ms. Lane.

Lisa Kennedy is a young widow living in Alaska with her daughter Lilly. Her husband, William, who was stationed overseas in the Army, had died eight months earlier. One day her life is changed forever by a knock on her door. Alex Dane, who served with Lisa's husband, is there to fulfill a promise to William to check on his wife and daughter and to give Lisa a few of his personal effects. Alex is very quiet and is determined to drop off the items and leave. The last thing in the world he wants to do is to stay and get attached.

Lisa invites him in for dinner and he ends up staying the night in a guest room. Since Alex has no where to go, an agreement is made that Alex will stay in the cabin on Lisa's land and help fix it up. Lilly had stopped talking since her father's death, whispers only to her mother. For some reason though, she starts interacting with Alex and even speaks directly to him.

Lisa is attracted to Alex and likewise, Alex is attracted to Lisa. But with her husband, her high school sweetheart, dead for only eight months, can Lisa move on without feeling guilty? Alex has had no one in his

life except the Army ever since his parents died when he was young. Can he accept love into his life again?

I want to share a few parts from the book that absolutely got to me.

Alex and Lilly have been bonding while he's teaching her how to fish. "Alex, I know you're not my daddy, but sometimes I wish you were," she said in a small voice. A paragraph or so farther down Lilly says, "I think Boston would like you as his dad too." Now, Boston is Lilly's dog and best friend, but still, those two passages stabbed me in my little black heart!

Lisa had gone to town with Lilly and Alex and Sally, her mother-in-law, saw them. Sally comes to the visit and asks about Alex. Lisa explains who he is and that he served with William and was there when he died. The two of them talk about whether William would be okay with Lisa being with Alex. Lisa tells Sally that she thinks that William would want her to be happy. Sally, still grieving over the loss of her only child tells Lisa, "Then you have my blessing."

Soldier on Her Doorstep was a quick and easy read. I thought the characters were interesting and realistic. It was a story of a healing, love, and acceptance. I definitely recommend it!

Alex is a soldier coming home from war. He has never really known family having lost his at such an early age and being put into foster care where he never found a home. His family became the military and his fellow soldiers. So when a soldier who died saving Alex's life requests that Alex deliver a message to his family Alex can't refuse. So Alex finds himself at Lisa's front door upholding his promise.

Lisa lost her husband months ago but when she sees this soldier on her doorstep she feels his pain and anguish and knows that she will do everything she can to heal this wounded soldier. Especially when her daughter Lily who hasn't spoken to anyone other than Lisa since her father died takes an interest in Alex. The man and girl bond and the relationship seems to help both of them. Lisa convinces Alex to stay and he becomes a part of their family. But when feelings begin to grow between Lisa and Alex both don't know what to do. Lisa doesn't want to betray her husband because she loved him and wouldn't want to do anything that would question that love. Alex feels guilt and knows that Lisa can never be his. He feels that he is the reason that Lily won't talk and that Lisa grieves and misses her husband. He feels that he took that away from them and that he doesn't deserve a family of his own.

Book Binge says

The premise for this story caught my interest, especially since it involves a soldier coming home from the war. I adore military heroes and Alex just seemed like he'd be such a yummy hero. The story was short but while I was reading it, I kept waiting for the story to get better. For me, the story just dragged, took its time unfolding and I found that I was too anxious for the story to take off and when it didn't, I put it down.

I put it down around the 100 page count and stepped away for a couple of days, thinking that I just wasn't in the mood for this book but when I went back to it and finished it, I wasn't blown away with the story as I had hoped I would be.

So we have Alex and Lisa coming together in this story. Alex served in the war with Lisa's husband and when he dies overseas, Alex is there and promises the husband that he will deliver some stuff to Lisa and he'd take care of them however he could. So Alex gets debriefed and immediately sets out for Alaska where his buddy's widow is living with their young daughter, Lilly. Alex has a lot of guilt running amock inside of him and going to see the woman who was married to the guy that he holds himself responsible for getting killed is very hard. When we first meet Alex, you can tell that he's got a lot of emotional baggage from the war.

I enjoyed seeing the bond that grew between Alex and William's daughter, Lilly. I thought it was a great addition to the story and it was the part of the story that I was most interested in reading. Lilly has stopped talking and the people in her life are starting to get worried but when Alex comes into the picture, Lilly starts to slowly come out of her shell. There's a scene in the book where Alex and Lilly are out on the lake in the boat with Lilly's dog Boston. It was a cute scene and when the scene was over, I was bummed because the book went back to being just okay.

I guess my issue with this book was that even though there's the emotional angst that both Alex and Lisa go through after losing William, I didn't really feel their grief. I didn't feel like Lisa really felt lost without William and I thought she fell too quickly in love with Alex. It just didn't seem natural or flow quite right with me.

Overall, the story felt flat for me and when I finally finished it, I was only too glad to move on.
