I'm not quite sure what to make of this short story. On the one hand, it was an interesting interpretation and Raphael and Emanuel came across as fairly well-rounded. On the other hand... I wasn't too keen on the limitations placed on Emanuel. I did like his relationship with the Arch angels, but there were some parts that didn't quite work for me.

The battle was quite well-written, but I was curious about what the merging of the angels entailed and how it all came about. I don't think I quite understood it from the way it was talked about, or why it had to be destroyed while Lukavel wasn't.

I found the story to be entertaining and I did laugh a bit at the way Emanuel led the Seraph away from the battle. Emanuel's character also seemed to be quite contradictory, an element I liked in the story.

I did notice a few errors in the story. There wasn't anything too major, but they were noticeable - at least to me.

I liked the interpretation of the different Arch angels' characters and I would have liked to see more of them. I also liked how the title of the story was woven into the story itself.

All in all, this was a quick, easy read and I did enjoy it.

In the never ending war of good and evil, often the fighting is here on this earth or in an earthly realm of some type. In *The Strength of a Giant*, a novella by Tony Passarelli, he chooses to set his final battle in the stars and heavens amongst the planets and galaxies that surround us. Giving us a complex and disingenuous

character with great intelligence in the form of Emanuel, who chooses to involve himself in the battle along with one of the most fearsome of the angels, the Arch Angel Raphael.

The evil comes in the form of a character known as Jovian, the amalgamation of fallen Angels, carrying both their strengths and weakness, along with any good or bad features. Utilizing these characteristics he has strength and agility that could very well bring about death and destruction. Will Emanuel and Raph as he is known, be able to stop him in time and save the solar system and our way of life forever?

Not only must Raph fight this battle he must also protect Emanuel from Jovian and possibly even from his own intricate ways of dealing with problems as he sees them. As this strangely intense battle reaches epic proportions, who will be the victor?

Passarelli has given us an interesting look at the heavens and its characters. He does a great job of creating a certain amount of flaws that make them easier to relate to and given the amount of danger involved he delivers a bit of human element. Yet there is no doubt that the battle is between titans of amazing abilities and proportions. The battle is well written the story quite bold.

This novella from Tony Passarelli fell flat. I see that it is a short story that fills a gap between other books, but having not read those books I had nothing to connect it to. From the start I was thrust into a story that I knew absolutely nothing about. My head was swimming as I struggled to make sense of it all. I never really figured out what the main battle in the story was about. Yes, I understand that it is an ageless and endless battle, the battle between good and evil, right and wrong, but I needed some more specifics.

I found this book rather offensive. I think, being a work of fiction, the author should have used entirely fictitious characters. One of the main characters was Emmanuel, the Son of God, the depiction of Emmanuel did not fit at all with how I see him, and what that name has come to mean to me.

I do not think that Emmanuel would ever swear (and those "F" bombs were ENTIRELY unnecessary.) I was so upset by the portrayal of not only Emmanuel, but of God the Father and the Arch Angels that I was tempted to put down this book and not finish it. "Strength of a Giant" by Tony Passarelli which I won from Goodreads Giveaways is a very short story about a war in heaven between the Union of Angelic Spirits under Jovian and the Archangels. It begins when Uriel is in danger and being followed by a pack of fallen angels. Emmanuel, the son of God and Raphael, an Archangel intervene and a war is sparked that traverses the Milky Way. Will good once again defeat evil? Will Raphael save Emmanuel from Jovian's evil intent or the reverse? These questions are answered in this short story about the forces of good and evil that collide in the Milky Way, changing the solar system forever.

The idea behind this plotline is creative, but uncomplicated. Because the characterization is thin, there's no depth to the storyline and there's a lack of emotional intensity, it reads more like an outline than a book. I found it difficult to read because I wasn't swept up in the plot. But, the premise of the story is imaginative and it would have made more of an impression if the framework had been flushed out and expanded.

The characters with their weaknesses and strengths seem more like gods of mythology with all their imperfections than biblical heavenly beings. For anyone of faith having the angels swear or "blow a raspberry" to make them more humanlike in nature is disconcerting and detracts from the basis of the story.
