The Statue of Liberty was not only a gift from the French government to the United States in celebration of their 100th Birthday, but according to legend, the idea was originated by a French Historian, Edouard de Laboulaye, who had studied U.S. History and felt the Declaration of Independence should apply in all countries! He didn't dare speak out because freedom of speech was not allowed under the laws of France. By creating this image for all the world to see, he could make a statement. He approached a renown sculptor at dinner that night with his idea, who was only persuaded because of what a huge masterpiece he could build. He died before he could begin and another sculptor pursued it instead.. presented the idea at a dinner party with other wealthy people. Laboulaye was able to persuade the government to do this as a "goodwill" gesture but was unable to persuade his government to fund it...It was the sculptor who created ways to raise the money.

When the statue was ready to transfer to America, the selfish millionaires of New York and other States refused to put up a dime for the foundation for it to stand on. It was through the unrelenting efforts of Joseph Pulitzer that 121,000 Americans sacrificed what little money each could to have this foundation built!

This is only a portion of the process presented in the book. There is so much more information involving the statue and those involved in creating this masterful wonder! It was simply written v=but so very interesting. People and events were well illustrated and actual photos of that time are included.

My daughter and I really enjoyed reading all about Lady Liberty's history, particularly about the initial idea and all of the work it took to bring it to fruition. I had no idea getting the pedestal built was probably the biggest obstacle they faced in the entire process! I love knowing that it was Americans (probably including many newly, or not yet naturalized citizens) that cooperated and raised enough money to finish building it. And while I appreciated the section discussing the statue as a national symbol, I could have done without the latent, nationalistic tone that seemed to come through when the author wrote about 9/11. It was a bit of a letdown at the end of an otherwise fabulous children's book.

Here we are on the cusp of the United States celebration of Independence and what better symbol of our country to read about for the occasion. I was fortunate enough to get to visit this enormous statue in 1976 during the Bicentennial. Yes, I walked up the 354 steps up to the crown and got to see out. It was glorious. However, that is not what I am here to talk about am I?

Joan Holub along with her illustrator, John Hinderliter began the book with the inception of the statue before it was even on paper. The duo gave complete history of the Statue of Liberty right on into present day.

The creator of the Statue of Liberty was Frederich-Auguste Bartholdi who saw the vision and created smaller versions until the statue we know now came to be. Gustave Eiffel from the later Eiffel Tower fame created the inner structures that help the statue together. This was news for me!

In fact, even though I visited this now American icon all those years ago, I learned a lot from this book. A few facts to share without giving away the entire book:

*Even though the statue was a gift, it was almost rejected by the American people, in particular the upper American wealthy at the time.

*Only the arm and the torch were originally brought to the U. S. for display. People paid to walk up a ladder to the top of the torch.

*The island the Statue of Liberty was placed on was chosen by the artist, originally called Bedloe Island.

* The statue was shipped in 350 pieces which had to be reassembled like a puzzle. The problem was that some of the boxes were mismarked upon leaving France.

*The sandals of Lady Liberty were 25 feet long, which is the equivalent of size 879.

I will not reveal more but there is so much more to read and fascinating history and people involved. The book also includes 16 original black and white photos which were absolutely amazing to see.

Overall, if you ever get the chance to see our nations Statue of Liberty you will not be disappointed. Until you can get there, read this book and learn a little about her before you go. You won't be disappointed in that either.

This book was educational yet also kept the attention of my 7-year-old. I knew the basic story behind the Statue of Liberty but this book had a few details that were also new to me. It has hand-drawn illustrations and real pictures.

Excerpt:

The statue's real name is Liberty Enlightening the World, but it's often called Lady Liberty or the Statue of Liberty. The statue is huge--151 feet and 1 inch tall. That's about as tall as a tower of thirty-five eleven-year-old kids stacked head-to-toe. It's made of copper and is mostly hollow, with a metal skeleton-like support structure inside and stairs so visitors can walk up into its crown. Today about four million people visit the Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island every year.
