Ivy Bailey, vampire hunter, works to keep the streets of Chicago safe from unruly vampires. Unbeknownst to her, though, she is being hunted as well. Christopher Bell, a vampire himself, shows up at the right place at the right time, and saves Ivy from an awful fate. This then begins a relationship that is great fun to watch unfold.

Gruesome murders are taking place in the city, and due to various reasons that are discovered much later in the book, Ivy is hand picked to hunt the person, or demon, responsible. Christopher, a vampire made in England a century prior, is in the city to do some investigating himself. After saving Ivy, the two are naturally drawn to each other and begin to dream of the other, something that should not be possible. Ivy tries to fight the attraction, but finds it hard to do. Christopher is not even what most would consider to be an attractive man, as most vampires are known to be. His strength and wit, though, draw in both Ivy and the reader. Christopher and Ivy soon also discover that their dream walking ability also extends to telepathy; again, something that should not be possible. Some of my favorite dialogue actually takes place during their mind reading. Ivy usually thinks of something that she shouldn't be, and then Christopher is right there to remind her that he can "hear" her. Its often quite comedic.

As Christopher and Ivy start dreaming of and following each other, they finally give into their attraction to each other and get hot and steamy. I felt like their first time together came kind of out of nowhere, but hey, what can you do when the hormones take over? The sex scenes are not overly detailed, drawn out, or too frequent, but Sizemore has a style that works and writes them in such a way that can still get the reader hot under the collar.

In addition to seeing Ivy and Christopher's point of views, we also get the same of the villain and his accomplices. Without giving too much away about who is the primary bad guy, I will say this: the main baddie does not work alone. He has minions to do his bidding, and what I really liked about this is that Sizemore creatively incorporated the use of well known real life sociopaths from the past century – Jack the Ripper, John Wayne Gacy, and Ted Bundy – to portray these minions. While Ivy is hunting the big baddie and his minions, she in turn, is being hunted by them. It makes for a great game of cat and mouse, and vice versa.

I think my primary drawback of this book relates to the lack of information we are provided about some issues. I felt like I finished the book and still had a lot of questions: Why didn't we learn more about Christopher's role as an Enforcer? Can we get more information about Enforcers in general and vampiric law? How will Christopher and Ivy work as a couple when certain "rules" say they shouldn't? Admittedly, I have not read any other books in this series – yet – so it's possible that this information is provided in previous books, and maybe we'll learn more about Ivy and Christopher as a couple in future books. I'm definitely interested in finding out.

Overall, Sizemore writes a great tale about vampire and vampire hunter, and draws the reader quickly into the story. Little is told about either Ivy or Christopher or their lives, and the reader watches their secrets unfold, even until the very end of the book. Well done, Sizemore!!

Ivy Bailey is not quite a vampire hunter; she is more of a vampire watcher. She observes vampires to make sure they are keeping themselves in line. If not, she'll report them to Chicago's head vampire. As she is following one particular vampire stalker, she realizes she herself is being stalked – by Vampire Enforcer Christopher Bell. After he captures her and takes her for questioning, they realize more is going on than they thought. There are ritualistic murders, disappearances, and a frightened city. However, both Ivy and Christopher are keeping secrets. Secrets that can affect the outcome of their investigation – and their lives.

Personal Demon by Susan Sizemore is the sixth entry into the Laws of the Blood series. The good news is that they don't have to be read in order. I had no idea it was a series when I jumped into number six and it didn't affect my reading enjoyment. Overall, Personal Demon is an average, but fun read. The plot was entertaining, but nothing remarkable. I guessed the villain about halfway through. The highlight was probably the relationship between Ivy and Christopher. They are two very unique individuals within their respective worlds and watching them get to figure each other out was quite the adventure. If there is a weakness in the story, it is the chapters told from Jack the Ripper's point of view. They just didn't hook me into the story.

Personal Demon is, although average, an urban fantasy novel that will likely entertain you. Did I enjoy this book? Yes. Would I recommend it? Yes. Do I think you'll remember it in six months or rush to pick up the rest of the series? Probably not. The author did leave Ivy and Christopher's story open ended and I would be curious where that goes, so if I saw a sequel to their story I might read it. If you read the blurb and it sounds like something you know you might like, this book is for you. Overall, I still had fun reading it (and that's the point, right?), so it earns a rating of 3 out of 5 stars.

PERSONAL DEMON is difficult book to review. Not because it's bad, but because it's so average on just about every level. The characters are fine though not really memorable, the plot is descent though nothing that really captivates, and the romance was pretty standard without any real excitement. There was never a scene that compelled me to keep reading, but there wasn't anything that put me off either. It's the kind of book you read because there isn't anything else around. There were a couple revelations about Ivy that were moderately interesting as they had implications on the longevity of the romance, but I wish there had been more.

The villain has several chapters written from his point of view, which may disturb some readers as he briefly discusses what he does to his victims including sexual mutilation. It's not graphic, but it is there. As a demonic Jack the Ripper, you can imagine.

Even though PERSONAL DEMON is the sixth book in the Laws of Blood series, it reads like a complete standalone. I haven't read the previous installments, so there may have been references to past books, but new readers won't ever feel like they missed anything. All in all, it reminded me of a weaker Victoria Nelson novel, but if you enjoy sexier urban fantasy, you might like PERSONAL DEMON.
