The pictures are nice. However, the text connection is very similar to the older version of The Little Red Hen. Just as the hen in the older version is making bread, this hen is making a pizza. This book is also a fairy tale that uses animals as speaking characters just as the other version. I also like how both books teach a lesson about being helpful. Great read.

The Little Red Hen Makes a Pizza written by Philemon Sturges and illustrated by Amy Walrod won the 1999 Golden Kite Award for picture book illustrations. This updated version of The Little Red Hen offers bold and creative illustrations that capture children's attention.

Walrod includes playful details in her illustrations such as a Do It Yourself Guide to Sink Installation and Other Things for Hen and Moo-Laa dollar bills with a cow where a president is typically found. These whimsical images create an enjoyable reading experience for children. In the end, Hen finds herself with an enormous pizza that she made completely by herself. Hen decides to share her feast and because of her generosity, the duck, dog and cat clean-up. The Little Red Hen Makes a Pizza is a light-hearted version of the original story.

Tara Schloetter says

This is a spinoff story of the little red hen who bakes bread, where nobody helps yet everybody wants some bread once it is baked. In this book, the little red hen decides to make a pizza and asks the dog, the cat, and the duck for help with some tasks, including finding a pizza pan, flour, mozzarella, pizza dough, and the topping. All the other animals refuse to help each time, yet when the little red hen kindly asks if they wanted any pizza, they all say yes. The ending of the book threw me off when it said, "Then she asked, 'Who will help me do the dishes?' Now can you guess what the duck, the dog, and the cat each said? They each said, 'I will.' 'I will.' 'I will.'" I thought this was a cute ending, and showed that the animals were grateful to the little red hen for the pizza. This book uses repetition, with the little red hen realizing she doesn't have something, asking her friends, her friends saying no, and then she goes to the store to get whatever she is

missing. This repetition creates an easy storyline for many ages of children to follow, and the collage illustrations are fun and silly to look at.

o Summary: The little red hen is wanting to make a pizza. She asks several of her neighbors and friends if they will help her make it. Every time she needed an ingredient to add to the pizza she asked the duck, the dog, and the cat. Every time she asked for something, they all said no. Whenever her pizza was finally done, she asked them if they would help her eat it and of course they all said yes. At the end she asked them if they will help her clean up and they say yes to that as well.

o Grade level: 2nd

o Appropriate classroom use story time

o Individual students who might benefit from reading anyone can learn from the lesson that it is important to help others around you even if it does not benefit you just like the dog, duck, and cat should have done before the hen asked if they wanted to eat the pizza.

o Small group use: silent reading

o Whole class use: Kids could put on a play. One child would be the hen. Another could be the dog and so on. There could also be a narrator.

o Related books in genre/subject or content area: On goodreads there were other books about pizza that popped up but that is about it.

o Multimedia connections available: there are online stories and videos available
