I have read a lot of zombie fiction and a few guides of this nature about surviving disasters, and the end of the world in particular. This is one of the better guides, and it's nice for it to feature the UK. A lot of thought has gone into this book and it covers all the things you need to know.

I have two minor complaints that would lose half a star off the rating if I could do that. Firstly, there are a few typos throughout the book and the formatting is a bit unhelpful. There are five main large chapters, and all the many sub-sections have the same heading style. This makes it hard to tell when a subject ends and another begins sometimes. Secondly, there are a couple of aspects of the advice I disagree with. For example, I would NEVER use a generator unless I wanted to attract hordes of the living and dead with the noise.

Minor issues aside, this is a good book and well worth a look whether you're a hardcore zombie fan or just a concerned citizen.

From the sections outlining a survival plan with a green focus to 'documented' coverups by the government of the United Kingdom, Mr. Page has all his bases covered.

My particular favourite section was the chapter rating the effectiveness of weapons both conventional and those that come out of left-field at combating the walking dead. While everyone would love to have a sawed-off pistol-grip pump to merrily blow the undead into piles of steaming innards, we're all not so lucky. Nailgun? There's a rating for that. Baseball bat? Better believe it gets touched on. From the normal to the things you'd never think of, it's just downright enlightening.

While I found this immensely entertaining, it's definately for the Zombie Enthusiast, being a real how-to guide rather than just a few nicely packaged pages of prose meant to entertain. I think everyone could enjoy

Like almost every zombie book I get, this wasn't exactly what I was expecting based on the cover. By the cover/title I had guessed it was going to be either a humor oriented book or a fake manual for a also fake British government agency that deals with zombies. What it turned out to be was a UK centered zombie survival guide.

Given, as the author of this book him self says in the recommended reading section, that Max Brook's The Zombie Survival Guide: Complete Protection From the Living Dead is "widely considered to be a bible of the upcoming struggle," it was very hard over the first 50 pages or so to not see this as a Severed Press/British knock off of that book. I think the fact that this book, like Brooks, starts off with fictional chapter of medical case studies through history along with a 4 level threat scale plus a fictional historical outbreaks section all made it feel like imitation.

Once past that beginning slump that felt a little to familiar the book really was a good and unique read. It set out to be exactly what Brook's book was but specifically for the citizens of the United Kingdom. It was fairly detailed and had a lot of good pointers on where to go to get more in depth information, making it feel like it could actually be used as a guide if this situation ever became real. Like I said it was detailed, but not TO detailed, it still read smoothly and I was able to enjoy it and finish it rather quickly.

Now, aside from my misgivings over the beginning (which I probably wouldn't have had if I had known what the book was going into it) I do have a few critiques. It could have been edited better. There were frequent errors, not spelling, but words typed wrong or missing. Not quite enough to take away from the read

but just enough to notice and remember and want to mention here. Along the lines of editing i felt it could have been organized better. There was no real chapter flow and somethings subjects that seemed they should have been placed together were books apart. As a reference guide I'd find it very hard to locate specific things I was looking for in the book with the way it is currently laid out.
