As of now I haven't been able to finish this story, which is a shame because Iv dedicated a lot of my time to it. Usually I hate leaving loose ends in terms of reading books but I just couldn't find it in me to go any further.

Here's why :

1) Hawk and Joy's so called 'Love' story was far too insta for me. I hate that! It's not real. No one falls in LOVE in one day.
