First up, I loved the setting. The Perth hills are a place I grew up visiting. My Gran lived there and so did other family. Tall trees, gravel that hurts when you skin your knees on it (I was a clumsy kid!) and a sense of freedom. Juanita Kees captures the setting perfectly.

I don't know so much about cars, but I found the workshop scenes believable -- and I loved Sheila (in joke! read the book and you'll understand).

The issues addressed in "Under the Hood" are serious ones, intense, and handled well.

But most of all the story is a romance, and it delivers. Scott isn't a perfect hero, but he's genuine; a man who grows through the story and through his relationship with TJ. TJ (the heroine) is a strong character. I enjoyed how Scott called her "Tiger". Nice endearment :)

Scott and TJ are such lovely characters. One of the things I find most appealing about them is their strong social conscience. Neither want to lose any of the boys in their programme (and yes, I cried at moments in this book).

This is the aspect that really makes this book for me. The programme sounds real and valuable and I enjoyed these secondary characters who are integral to the growth of the relationship between Scott and TJ. I love that TJ is different to the 'usual' female protagonist. Steel-capped boots and overalls don't detract from her femininity but heels and high hair are equally great -- Scott loves both, and so did I.

And I can't wait for Detective Mark's story. He strikes me as a real catch. What will the woman who wins him be like?

I both liked and disliked this one. So I will break this out to what I liked and what I did not like

What I liked:

I really, really liked TJ and Scott. I liked that TJ was a kick ass mechanic and what she was trying to do making a refuge for troubled teens, trying to keep them from gangs and off drugs. I liked how Scott came around and how involved he became in getting the program off the ground. And up to that point with a few minor exceptions I thought the story rocked. I stayed up way past my bedtime to finish

What I did not like:

At about 75% is where my dislike started. At this point a "sordid" person from Scott's past makes an appearance, while I get why...I don't think it was necessary...it just seemed kinda gratuitous... I mean it's

pretty obvious the sordid person has hooked up with the “real” bad guy (I am not a writer so I could be totally wrong...but the story would have worked fine without this person making an appearance). There is tragedy, posturing, false accusations...TJ & Scott get their HEA and while we know “who done it”...that part is just left hanging...”they are just waiting for him to make a mistake and will be there when it happens”. I was sooooo disappointed.

Now maybe I am just a little to blood-thirsty....but I want the bad guy caught and to “get his just desserts” I mean it can’t really be an HEA if a part of the story is left unresolved right...now if this is going to be a series I can see leaving it where it ended...but for a stand alone/single book story to end like that really irritated me....It was like we had a well thought out story line for the majority of the book and then a rushed and incomplete ending.

I would rate the first part as 4 stars and the second as 2 stars so it averages out to 3 star rating.

Cars, smouldering eyes, troubled teens and ice cold beers - that and more in *Under the Hood*, an Aussie novel with a raw undertone.

Scott and TJ are your Couple in Crisis. Their love-hate relationship is magnetic from the start, and TJ is one badass heroine! Scott tries his best to take charge of the struggling car dealership, but little does he realise the complexity of the dealership and its employees. The dealership is tied up in a teenage rehabilitation program, and gangs, drugs, violence and danger are an ever-present cloud that hangs over the day to day goings-on.

TJ's kind, open heart towards these teenagers makes you love her from the get-go. Scott is a hottie, but his smoking exterior isn't his only attraction. His friendliness, concern for the teenagers and his protectiveness when it comes to TJ are admirable qualities in a 'pompous arse' (as TJ eloquently describes him as). The teens are loveable; from Marty to the unfortunate Tiny. And Scott's dog Sarge is a heart-stealer as well.

Put all these characters in the setting of semi-rural Western Australia and you have yourself a winner!

My only criticism (not really a criticism - more like a note on what could be improved) was that I thought the attraction between TJ and Scott often overpowered the storyline somewhat. TJ's 'hot and cold' reaction to Scott was understandable, but did tend to get tiring when it occurred repeatedly. I would also have liked to have seen the main plot line develop further and to have been completed - I'm not sure whether a second book is in the making, but the book left the story unfinished. Towards the end (with the clues Tiny left behind) I was engrossed in the plot. But once again, with the ending, the emphasis turned once more to the Scott-TJ relationship.

Which isn't a bad thing (they're a very cute couple!) but I would have liked an ending that tied up the loose ends.

The humour was often spot-on, and made for some good laughs. An 'Aussie' myself, I wasn't completely sold on the amount of beer they all consumed - it seemed almost like each character downed two or three beers a day! - but I guess everyone has their preferences! And TJ definitely needed a good drink after some of the situations she had to deal with.

I praise Juanita for not over-doing the Australian aspects of the novel. So many authors tend to do this - and movie producers - but not Juanita. She manages to transport you directly to WA, but you're comfortably settled into your surroundings. The Australian lifestyle and environment is not thrown in your face every five seconds, with koalas and kangaroos invading the house and the neighbours wearing cork hats.

Juanita does away with stereotypes and gives you a raw novel that entertains as well as informs.

The Deal: When taking over his newest dealership in semi-rural Australia, the least thing Scott Devin expected to find was TJ Stevens, the shop's manager and lead mechanic, wearing a skirt and impractical shoes and telling him to cool it while she deals with some stuff.

Scott is none too amused by this and quickly fires her, only to realize that TJ is pretty much the heart of the dealership and he hires her again.

TJ (short of Tiffany Jo, I think) is a pretty good mechanic and she loves working at the dealership, though not as much as she loves the teenage rehabilitation program she runs; and the de campground she inherited from her grandfather.

She doesn't have time for Scott... too bad she can't seem to get away.

My Thoughts: *sigh* From the cover I thought Under the Hood would be a fun, cute, fluffy story but it wasn't. It starts fun enough but then things get muddled pretty quickly.

The plot jumps from one thing to another with little explanation or link between events, so much so that I often felt like I was reading the cliff notes of the story, rather than the actual story. It was oddly episodic and overly complicated for it's length.

I liked Scott and TJ at the beginning, there were some cute moments between them but the development of their relationship seems to be on fast forward from the start which doesn't leave much room for character development.

Under the Hood is Australian romance author Juanita Kees' first novel with Escape Publishing. The premise intrigued me instantly, a heroine who runs a car dealership in a small country town in Western Australia who wears mini skirts... I knew TJ Stevens was going to be an interesting character.

TJ is a mechanic and team leader and is well respected by her colleagues as she works hard and she's fair. She also has a stake in the dealerships apprenticeship for troubled teens and her passion and enthusiasm for this program is palpable. With the dealership being bought out by successful businessman Scott Devin, TJ has to prove herself and the program's usefulness if it's the last thing she does. This is a little more difficult than she thought when Scott Devin turns up at the dealership one week early and fires her almost immediately. There's an instant attraction between them and of course TJ gets her job back when Scott realises he acted prematurely following four resignations and a missing teen after TJ's dismissal.

Even though I enjoyed the story, I do feel like it was lacking something. As I write this review on a Sunday morning I'm afraid I may not succeed in articulating why exactly I felt that way.

I just didn't feel the connection between TJ and Scott initially, it felt a little forced in the beginning. I think the conflict was a bit weak too. Typically in romance there's the internal and the external conflict that create that create tension around the couple as to why they can't be together. Though the external conflict was present- neither wanted to overstep their working relationship of boss and employee- the internal conflict was really lacking. At the outset I could understand why TJ was reluctant to become involved with her boss, but as the story progressed this conflict wasn't strong enough to sustain the tension and I started to get frustrated. If the author had an internal conflict (e.g. fear of getting hurt/ rejected/ abandoned etc) to fall back on then the reason for keeping them apart would have been more believable. So, in this sense I found it hard to connect with the couple in their determination to remain just friends. Nevertheless, I did want them to work things out and I was satisfied with the ending.

I really liked TJ as a heroine and her passion for helping the teenagers, she really went above and beyond to help them and it sparked many other sub-plots in the story including a murder mystery. As the story progressed and the suspense heightened I found myself enjoying this story even more. Though I didn't know at the outset, this story forms part of a series (see the author's explanation [here](#)) as the murder mystery wasn't resolved and will likely be continued on in the next instalment.

Under the Hood is a promising start to a romance series set in country Western Australia by Australian author Juanita Kees.
