I've almost forgotten what it felt like to love a book so much that you want to yell it from the mountaintops, talk about it ALL the time, and fumble through a review trying to put into words WHY it meant so much to you. It's been awhile since I've been in this position. But here I am...and I'm unsure what to say.

I've read some of TJ Klune's books, not all. But what I do notice when I read reviews of his books, people often seem to say, "If you like TJ Klune's writing, you'll like this book". I kinda laugh since, you know, TJ wrote each of those books...but I actually do understand what this means. TJ has a distinct voice and style. And it works for some and not for others, I guess.

So, I'll start by saying, if you like TJ Klune, you'll like this book. But I'll also say, if you haven't liked TJ Klune in the past, you'll like this book. And will add, if you've never read TJ Klune, you'll like the book. Because this book has his voice, has his style, but has it in a way that works so brilliantly that the book becomes more than just voice or style. It has signature zaniness in what seems like a very simple story...but underlying is this treasure of heart and depth, surprisingly layered and thoughtful, and wickedly smart in its wit.

How To Be A Normal Person is quirky and over-the-top, laugh-out-loud-over-and-over-again funny, and the pace is insane...zingers and badabingbadaboos thrown at you all over the place. But, it feels like a joy ride that leaves you exhilarated rather than a roller coaster that makes you sick by the end.

Gus is abnormal and weird and strange. After losing his father, he goes about living a simple and regimented life, running a video rental store. His best friends are a coffee shop owner w/ drag-queen hair, and a 3-woman gang/possibly sisters?/possibly lovers? of no-nonsense, of-a-certain-age ladies. And his heart is taken by an asexual stoner hipster named Casey. That, in a nutshell, is the insanity of this book.

But here's where the SPECIAL comes in: in an attempt to be good for Casey, to be HAPPY, Gus decides to try and be NORMAL. And he finds himself on the internet, researching how to go about this...as we all do. The "character" of the internet is hysterical and some of the best humor writing I've read in a long time.

Here's also where the SPECIAL comes in: memories of Gus's father, Pastor Tommy...who loved his son so completely and with such care...I'm tearing up just thinking back on those parts. What an endearing and

committed bond they shared. (*pass the tissues*!)

Here's another part where the SPECIAL comes in: unlike so many of the books I read today, in this book EVERY SINGLE CHARACTER speaks the truth. They all tell it like it is. They don't bullshit or gloss it over. They all speak truth. And I f*cking loved it...I didn't expect that to be so refreshing!

Here's just one more part where the SPECIAL comes in: all this talk about an asexual character, and the relationship with an asexual character. But it had so little to do with their relationship at all! It may have been an adjective for Casey, but it didn't define Casey. And it didn't define Casey and Gus. I loved that! It was a perfect display of acceptance that didn't feel political or preachy or teachy...but it just felt...normal. And if anything, it felt like a celebration of how normal it can be!

Gus is one of my favorite characters of all time. He suffers from verbal diarrhea. He is cranky. He is hurt, but healing. He is uncertain. He is determined. He is so special, I can't stand how much sometimes. He's just Gus. And I love him.

There's so much that's amazing about this book, but Gus...yeah, he made it for me.

The world is coming to an end.

Gus doesn't know how to deal with him. Casey is too handsome for words. Too pushy. Too damn adorable.

Gus's mind shortcircuits.

Casey is an outgoing hipster obsessed with selfies, Instragram and marihuana.

He's so damn irritating!

Gus can't think straight.

And everything is turned upside down.

It's Casey's fault.

But somehow, Casey's opinion begins to matter. Gus doesn't ponder this, he just assumes he's not normal.

Oh, and the rest of the 290 pages? A poor attempt at using non sequitur as humor. Truman, walk into Lottie's Lattes and he meets Casey Richards, a stoner hipster who turns his world upside down.

Gus is immediately both repelled and fascinated by Casey...but more time spent with Casey makes Gus want

something he's never really thought to want before: he decides he wants to be "normal" so he can be with Casey. What follows is both touching and hilarious as Gus sets about trying to be the best normal person he can be with some interesting results.

This story about a man who accepts everyone, even if he's snarky about it, gave me so many feels. I got a total heart boner. Seriously, this story good touched me all over my heart.

There are three things I expect from a TJ Klune story: 1. To laugh. Oh, how I laughed. I laughed *a lot*. 2. To have wookie-cry-face at some point. Yep, that happened too. **Woah, where do I begin with this one?? An asexual stoner, a socially awkward video-store owner, and three lesbians/possibly sisters walk into a bar....**

For those readers who are afraid that this book isn't a classic T.J. Klune book (aka, really, really funny with lots of feelz), never fear! T.J. still brought the laughs (I dare you not to crack a smile at stoner scrabble), and still brought lots of emotion. However, **this is a more *subdued* T.J. Klune. A little more... understated.** I actually thought it was an awesomely refreshing change of pace, and though this book felt SO T.J., it also felt more mature in a lot of ways.

Gus was an interesting character. He is quiet, he likes routine, and he fiercely misses his deceased stoner dad. He also hates Michael Bay and pickles... a lot. Though Gus comes out of his shell throughout the course of the book, I really enjoyed how unique he was from other characters that I've seen.

Casey was... I mean, how could I not love a sexy (yes, asexuals can be sexy!), scruffy, hipster with a great

sense of humor and an outgoing personality? He was fun and engaging, and I loved how persistent he was with Gus. I also have a weakness for a stoner, as my friends and I went through some... *\*cough cough\**... phases in college. High logic always makes me smile.

**Normally T.J. Klune does awesome side characters, but here he really outdid himself. I**

ADOREDDDDDDDD the lesbian/possibly sisters trio of tough motorcycle ladies that made up Gus's crew. I swear, they made the book for me in a lot of ways! What I wouldn't do to have a couple of tough bitches like them by my side. All of them, even Casey's friends, brought something interesting and fun to the table.

In terms of the romance, it was there and it was adorable! Casey brought out the personality and spark in Gus, and Gus was a quiet, loving rock for Casey. I loved their flirtations and their easy banter. The romance was lovely, very slow burn, and, as the blurb suggests, verrrrryyyyy G rated. In fact, if you are looking for something more explicit than a couple of kisses and some hugs, look elsewhere. **I completely bought the romance, though I struggled a bit, if I'm being honest, with the whole asexuality aspect.**

It is hard for me, being so far on the other end of the asexuality spectrum, to imagine a relationship with someone with whom even physical affection is difficult. A lot of the way I show and perceive love with my SO is through pats on the butt, spontaneous make out sessions, and feeling physical closeness to my husband. I'm a very affectionate, sensual person. Gus always asked permission to even hug Casey, and I simply could not imagine myself in that kind of situation. Now, I recognize that this is 100% my own issue and, in fact, this kind of incompatibility is discussed in the book, but it made the chemistry in the story feel a little less potent for me, if I'm being perfectly honest.

However, that being said, I think that Casey and Gus were a great match. Gus understood and respected Casey's limits implicitly and vice versa. **I also appreciated how the book educated us readers a little on the sexuality spectrum without feeling too didactic.** It flowed naturally with the story.

**I think if you are looking for an offbeat, well done, super funny, sweet romance, you've found your match with this story. Though it is relatively low angst and shows a more subdued style, it still leaves a big impact with characters you won't soon forget.**

T.J. Klune's Bear, Otter, and the Kid is the book that brought me into the wonderful world of gay romance and it's books like How to Be a Normal Person that make me glad I haven't strayed. This book has so much of the heart, humor and love that I expect from T.J. without being over the top. For me this was classic T.J. Klune and I ate it up.

Gustavo Tiberius (if it sounds familiar it was the name of the star of one of Bear's rants in The Art of Breathing) is a creature of habit, with resting bitch face and an outward disdain for most things he comes across. He won't admit to being lonely, but he has been ever since the death of his father and best friend Pastor Tommy. I could relate to Gus's need to find comfort in routine and avoiding people who tell him to smile. Gus has friends who care (though he won't admit to it) and accept him for the person he is, even if it

may be a bit weird or quirky.

Casey Richards is an asexual hipster stoner who has moved to town and is working in his aunt's alliteratively named coffee shop, where Gus gets his coffee every morning. Their first meeting had me laughing to the point of tears and has Gus reeling. Casey is immediately taken with Gus, as you can tell from his Instagram post, and Gus is thrown off his orderly path.

As Casey quickly worms his way into Gus's life and heart, Gus begins to try to become "normal" so that he will be what he perceives is worthy of Casey, and hilarity, sweetness and love ensue. Gus finds a wiki-type article on the internet to guide him (but first he has to get the internet and recover from his accidental fall into the pornado that is Tumblr) and embarks on his journey into so-called normalcy, not understanding that Casey likes Gus for who he is, judgmental eyebrows and all. While the internet may be his launch pad, it is really Gus's memories of his stoner father's words that help light the way, as well as the advice of the women who have taken it upon themselves to care for him (whether he admits he wants it or not) and a possibly prescient Inspirational Quote of the Day calendar.

I couldn't have loved Gus and Casey more. They fit together so well and while there may not be sex, there was intimacy, love, romance and respect. For Gus, Casey is Casey. For Casey, Gus is just Gus. Labels don't matter as they build a relationship that works for them.

All the secondary characters, the We Three Queens, Lottie and Casey's hipster friends from L.A. dubbed by Gus the Three Ironic Amigos, had distinct personalities and their own quirks as only T.J. Klune can write.

This was a wonderful, slow burn, funny and sweet romantic comedy. You'll laugh, you'll cry, you may get a contact high, but I doubt you'll regret reading it. #JustGoReadIt

Okay, I'm at a loss. How am I supposed to review TJ Klune's latest book, "**How To Be a Normal Person**"?

Yes, it was insanely good, but it was also a lot like it's main character, **Gustavo Tiberius**. That is to say, "**weird and abnormal and strange**," compared to my usual reads.

When I heard his next book was an asexual, stoner hipster comedy, my first and only real thought was, "**Uhhh...**" <-- *Yes, eloquent, I know.*

Then TJ gifted me with a galley copy of the book pre-release and I (*lost my motherfucking mind for a bit, then*) thanked him for trusting me with his latest baby.

My last TJ read, "**The Lightning Struck Heart**," was a full-on comedy of epic proportions. TLSSH was incredibly over-the-top, in the best way possible, with in-your-face fun coming so fast, at times it was hard to breathe through all of the snort-inducing laughter.

But "How To Be a Normal Person?" It's **a sneaky bastard of a book humor-wise**. This one is definitely different than anything else that I've read before from TJ, which I also really enjoyed.

TJ can write the shit out of funny dialogue, without a doubt, but I continue to be amazed by the subtle differences in his comedic style.

The first few chapters were all about 29 y.o. **Gus flexing his snark and distaste for the world**, because his loving father passed away fairly recently and he hasn't yet regained his equilibrium.

MC #1, Gus, as I pictured him:

However, when 23 y.o. **Casey, an asexual, stoner hipster**, arrives in Gus' small hometown of Abby, Oregon, **any equilibrium that Gus felt he had was immediately and unequivocally shot**. He was completely unnerved. **Done**.

MC #2, Casey, as I pictured him:

But as much as Gus loathes Californians, and hipsters, and quite literally \*everything\*, -- especially Michael Bay -- **Casey is an unstoppable force in Gus' very regimented existence**.

**And. It. Was. AWESOME.**

**The humor was low-key and well-timed**, coming at you from several directions. Only more subtly this time around.

The '**We Three Queens**,' a geriatric biker (Vespa) gang of possibly-sisters, possibly-polyamorous lesbians, who have been Gus' constant, since his father passed away. Well, let's just say that they were **a funny trio of tough old broads**, especially when Gus was taking himself too seriously -- which was pretty much always.

Then we have the '**Three Ironic Amigos**,' Casey's friends from LA, one of whom he used to date, who are **fucking crazy. And funny as hell**. I actually liked them a bit more than the We Three Queens, if I'm being honest.

Oh, and I can't forget the **tech support calls** that the extremely-quirky Gus made to his **Internet Service Provider**. Fuck me. That was some pure comedy gold there, folks. **"Mitzi, Mitzi, Mitzi."**

And once Gus actually has Internet access? Sweet Jesus, his trips to online **self-help advice forums** on everything from **"How to be a Normal Person"** to **"How to Hide an Erection"**?

God, **I really couldn't stop laughing**, as Gus tries, sometimes desperately, to be normal, initially so that Casey will like him, then later, much to Gus' amazement, also **for himself**.

**And the 'feels?' Yep, we had plenty of those, too.** Mostly between Gus and Casey, but also through several flashback scenes between Gus and his deceased father, which were very touching.

In the end, Gus finally realizes that **it's okay, even good, to be a bit weird and abnormal and strange** and the boys do get their **happily ever after**.

Do I generally prefer my reads to be a bit sexier? Sure, most people that I interact with on Goodreads do.

But did I miss the sexiness this time out? **Absolutely not.** Because Gus gave the best hugs. ;- )

***“Can I hug you first?” Gus choked out, unsure why he suddenly had a lump in his throat. Casey’s smile widened.***

***“Yeah, man. I’d really like that. You’re starting to give me some of the best hugs of my life. I’ll never say no to a hug from you.”***

"How To Be a Normal Person" was **both refreshing and different, with tons and tons of subtle humor**, so I really can't recommend it enough.

I've said it before and I'll say it again, not being able to add quotes from an audiobook sucks. This book was full of amazing one liners and tons of quality banter! Not to mention characters that will stick with you long after you've finished listening.

Because this is an audiobook review I'm not going to delve too much into the storyline. I mainly want to talk about the incredible narration of Derrick McClain. At first I wasn't too sure of the story. It's definitely not what you'd call fast paced, and the first chapter or so is just an introduction to Gus and his routine. Due to the more sedate nature of the introduction I wasn't too sure of McClain to begin with. He definitely wasn't bad, but he didn't grab my attention either. However, by the end of the book I knew I wouldn't ever be able to read this book because any voice in my head wouldn't come close to emulating the true voices of Gus and Casey, which was of course McClain doing.

I think sometimes that's where really amazing narration can be set apart of good narration, that quality that draws you into the story and makes these characters real in a way that can't happen in your imagination. You can hear these men falling in love. They're right there telling you how they feel. It really is incredible. McClain made this story excellent for me, I would've enjoyed it if I'd read it, but not to the extent I did listening to it.

Needless to say, I **LOVED** his voices for Gus and Casey, they were completely different but complimented each other perfectly, much like the characters.

These characters are definitely what made this book! Gus is so quirky in that deadpan way. I have a soft spot for grumpy characters and Grumpy Gus was definitely my favourite so far. Then there's Casey, sweet stoner Casey. He was just lovely! But these two together were even lovelier!!

I think the downside to this book was it's a bit too long considering nothing happens. I also don't think I found this book as laugh out loud funny as a lot of other people. I was certainly still smiling throughout the whole book and will never hear phrases like 'what the hell?' or 'Oh my God!' again without hearing Gus.

This book is definitely on the slower side and it was nice to listen to on and off over the course of a week, but I'd definitely recommend it! McClain gets 5 hearts for making me fall so in love with Gus and Casey.
