I bought Piano Rats on a whim because it looked like the kind of poetry I had been reading lately, and it did not disappoint. The poems (or stories) are beautiful, meandering, searching, colloquial, and constantly surprising. To me, they seemed to represent the endless possibilities juxtaposed against the looming existential dread of being in your 20s. (That sentence may be the most pretentious thing I've ever written.)

So when Curbside Splendor offered a Gold membership for half the price, I jumped on it partially because I knew this author had another book. The poems (or stories) in this book fulfill the promise of delving into

other people's lives while maintaining the same voice as the first book. And, of course, there are two important additions: the artwork by Shawn Stucky and the postcard format.

The postcard format perfectly encapsulates the ephemeral nature of these poems while giving the reader a chance to make his or her own connection with another, much as the author did with her typewriter. The artwork too seems to match the tone of the poems while adding a distinct artistic point of view. After reading a book of ekphrasis by this same publisher, these poems and artwork seem to embody the overall aesthetic impression, if not the exact rules, of ekphrasis.

Definitely recommend. And if you enjoyed this book, pick up Piano Rats.
