Like the other reviewers I have read all 4 books in this series and will continue to do so until the author cries uncle or runs out of steam. Thus far Mary Jane Maffini is definitely doing neither.

This fourth entry in Maffini's Charlotte Adams series continues to do quite a bit more than just hold my interest. The people/characters in this series evolve and grow in their relationships and develop along with Charlotte as the plot thickens. And believe me it does thicken.

Lorelei Beauchamp is an aging beauty who has lost her only daughter, Anabel, in an unforeseen accident. Or was it an accident? That's what Lorelei doesn't believe contrary to the police and her husband, Harry.

Charlotte becomes involved in this web of intrigue by trying to disprove Lorelei's belief that her daughter was murdered.

While all this is the foundation for an unsolved and unrecognized murder...Charlotte is busy trying to organize Lorelei's 7 closets with the assistance of Harry(Lorelei's husband). Unfortunately, Lorelei is little help due to her grief over her daughter's sudden death.

At the same time Charlotte notices Nick's apparent panic attacks when anything pertaining to Anabel's murder scene is mentioned. What is hidden behind those attacks and why?

I so much enjoyed this book because of the characters involved. Jack came through in child care at his bike store, CyCotics. And Charlotte turns up a box full of photos from their younger years while pulling down blankets for little Nick in Jack's closet. But why does Jack have so many pictures of Charlotte?

Charlotte's relationship with Pepper grows stronger and soon Pepper realizes that she can depend on Charlotte once again.

Charlotte finds a dependable and creative assistant in Lilith and 2 new aides in neighbors living across the street from the murder scene.

The series as a whole is an acquired taste, and with the previous installment (Death Loves a Messy Desk) I downgraded it from "put on Xmas list" to "borrow from library". This one is no worse than Death Loves a Messy Desk, except perhaps that it's extremely repetitive. The case Charlotte is solving involves the death of a woman at a construction site that was believed to be an accident, but her mother is convinced it was murder. As Charlotte meets new people to discuss the situation, she has to restate what she's learned and why she's asking these seemingly impertinent questions, and it gets tiresome after a while. Still, the organizing tips are always worth a glance, and there are some chuckles along the way, so if you're looking for a light read, this is probably a good bet.

In this one the husband of a friend hires her to help his wife not just organize closets but to try to get her out of a deep depression over losing her daughter. When the woman says she thinks her daughter was murdered, Charlotte is off and running to investigate, despite the repeated warnings by her friends and the police.

Complications occur when Pepper is severely beaten and her husband Nick is missing and assumed to be the assailant. Charlotte knows Nick would never hurt Pepper and that the cops are on the wrong track.

I enjoy this series, but I can't really give this one more than three stars because with editing it could be so much better. There's a lot of unnecessary repetition as Charlotte tells her story and asks her questions more than once. This could've been a much tighter story without some of the side details. It could've been a four easy, but it's not as it is, at least not to me.
