They have to pay the bills and split the chores. Anyone finding this exciting—or caring at all about it?

Jen reminded me of myself, wanting to go to the movies early in the day so it's cheaper. That's my MO! Chelsea invited her bf, completely rude. But what was worse was that the girls said she didn't have to tell them he was coming. Um, yeah. She does. It isn't her house.
