Nikita Singh's Letters to My Ex starts with our protagonist, Nidhi's, letters that she writes to herself stating why and how she broke her engagement with her fiance Abhay. The letters are simple description about her perspective of and feelings for Abhay. Her letters say how they met and how everything fell into pieces and how everything led to her and Abhay's long term relationship, and finally how Nidhi came to the conclusion that Abhay loved her no more.

I have to be honest here. This was my first novel by Nikita Singh and I have had heard a lot about her books. So naturally I had a lot of expectations from this novel. But I was a tiny bit let down. I wanted a good, strong story which this novel lacks. I mean, it's well and good what the message of the book is, but I wanted more. The book had a lot of potential for a good background story. But readers are deprived of it. I was kind of wishing for snippets of romantic memories from Nidhi and Abhay's past so that I could feel more attached to the characters. But I could not.
