Firstly, let me say that I received a copy of this to review as part of the Goodreads First Reads programme. Thanks very much to Lisa for sending me a copy.

The premise interested me from the start, although my initial thought was that the book seemed quite short. The writing was good and the characters were for the most part well developed. My main concern was I felt that the end of the book wrapped up rather hurriedly and could have stood to be fleshed out some more. It felt to me that the pacing changed and the ending was more rushed than could have been.

To be fair I don't read many short stories, I thought that it was good for a short story, but short on details for a full length novel.

I give this book 3* as all in all it's a good read that had interesting and thought provoking themes throughout.

Four teens gather in the woods to perform an ancient Sumerian ritual. They've practiced for years. They've created all their own tools, patterned in this world after the designs in a sacred book. And now it's time. The end of the world, 2012, is coming soon, and these teens will stand at the front, ushering in a new age on the blood of others. Meanwhile one lonely, innocent girl follows them. And a little boy cries.

The scene is set for a truly scary, exciting teen adventure with strong male and female protagonists, teens and adults both wise and wounded or both. Not one for the squeamish, there's blood and death aplenty in this tale, though one of the teens grows averse to killing, and even while the earth is dying, another insists there's still hope.

The author mingles Christian concepts with Mayan prediction to build a nicely ambiguous mythology; the Ancient Ones locked behind the seventh portal, Elders distantly protective, an unknown guide who waits to be revealed. Ghosts seek the light, walk the earth, or are vanquished to hell. Meanwhile Tristan, Evelyn and friends battle against time to save their world from becoming a larger hell.

Past and present haunts many of these teens as it does in the real world. Identities are just forming. Loyalties are tested. The characters seem very real. Their predicament in this well-plotted tale keeps the reader turning pages. The writing is smooth though occasionally wordy. And the ending truly satisfies, bringing a sense of completeness, change and hope.

I really enjoyed this book. Reminding me of G.P. Taylor's Wormwood, it has evocative description, clever ambiguity of belief, well-drawn background, good timing with intriguing revelations, and a plausible logic that lingers pleasingly.

At first glance, I loved the eye-catching cover-art and the title font - Yes, I said the font, I am a big fan of typography! The "pencil-sketched" look was just the right amount of color versus shading to capture my attention; just like the book's first couple pages. The Hour Of Tiamat started off at a good pace, and the content peaked my curiosity. I found the story-line well-written, full of action, and realistic enough to be unsettling. I particularly enjoyed the descriptions of the wolves/demons and how they moved, but the characters lacked structure and often seemed "flat". I like characters I can relate to, someone with body, depth, and a well-defined personality; unfortunately, the characters and some of the dialogue took away from my reading experience. Even with the few problems I mentioned, I still really liked the book overall, and I will be recommending it to readers interested in supernatural/fantasy/occult fiction. I will be on the lookout for Lisa M. Taylor's future books - her writing definitely has potential!
