While traveling in Calgary, Alberto Manguel was struck by how the novel he was reading (Goethe's "Elective Affinities") seemed to reflect the social chaos of the world in which he was living. An article in the daily paper would suddenly be illuminated by a passage in the novel; a long reflection would be prompted by a single word. He decided to keep a record of these moments, rereading a book each month, and forming "A Reading Diary": a volume of notes, reflections, impressions of travel, of friends, of events public and private, all elicited by his reading. From "Don Quixote" (August) to "The Island of Dr. Moreau" (February) to "Kim" (April), Manguel leads us on an enthralling adventure in literature and life, and demonstrates how, for the passionate reader, one is utterly inextricable from the other.

Reading Alberto Manguel is always a reader's holiday. The incredibly wide universe of his reading and the cultured and erudite explanations of those readings give readers a shared feeling of the joy books bring as well, at least in my case, knowledge of writers and books unknown and unread. One reads him with a pen in hand, at the very least to make note of new titles he discusses.

This book is an exploration of a theory that when immersed in a good book the reader begins to see manifestations of one's reading in every aspect of everyday life. Anyone who has either written a thesis or been close to someone writing one may have experienced the determined manner in which the thesis writer sees the work reflected in the world around them. Often, annoyingly, in everything.

Manguel here reads one of his favorite books each month from the year. Each chapter describes thoughts on the book and also anecdotes and discussion on everyday topics. In the end it is an often mesmerizing and ultimately enjoyable glimpse inside a reader's diary.

Manguel's observations, often quotes from the book at hand or another, are deeply familiar to readers everywhere. As in this gloss from Machado de Assis:

"The worst defect of this book is you, reader," says Machado de Assis accusingly, halfway through *The Posthumous Memoirs of Brás Cubas* (which I pulled off the shelf on another sleepless night). 'You are in a hurry to grow old and the book progresses all too slowly; you like your stories straightforward and packed with action, told in a measured and easy-flowing style, and this book and my style are like two drunkards, swaying from left to right, starting and stopping, complaining, shouting, laughing out loud, threatening heaven above, slipping and falling. ...' "

I appreciate how Machado points out exactly the ever present temptation to shy away from difficult books to the tried and true and the straight and narrow.

In speaking of one of his lifelong favorites Manguel poignantly sums up the eternal gap between our reading and that of others:

"I'm always surprised to discover how few of my friends have read it. We assume that what delights us must delight others; in fact, we all realize in the end that our private circle of fellow readers, those who share our intimate loves, is very small"

And finally, on the last page Manguel gives voice to the a essential truth about most of the books we treasure:

"Up to a certain point, this is true of every book we love. We think we approach it from a distance, watch it part its protecting covers, observe the unfolding of its tale from a safe seat in the audience, and we forget how much the survival of the characters, the very life of the story, depends on our presence as readers—on our curiosity, on our desire to recall a detail or to be surprised by an absence—as if our own capacity for love had created, from a tangle of words, the person of the beloved."

Reading a book about reading, and specifically one whose table of contents consists of a list of books, it would be reasonable to assume an interest or at least a curiosity, on the part of a reader, in the actual titles.

Although this did not turn out to be the case, when I first confronted the titles in AM's short list, I thought: boring. Most of these books are familiar , and I had read 4 or 6 of them, so long ago that I was not entirely certain. Did I really read Kim, or was it just an abridged selection for school? Did I ever finish Elective Affinities after losing it 20 pages before the end? Why couldn't I remember the end? For that matter, did I ever finish Don Quixote, which at 14 I found lugubrious, or Wind in the Willows, which I read before learning how to actually read?

During my childhood, these were the go-to books that I would return to when I had read all my library books, but I had a tendency to begin a book at the beginning each time I picked it up. So here were some old friends but also, with his childhood spent in South America, AM adds to my list considerably. He is right to criticize North American literacy. I had never heard of Adolfo Bioy Casares, Dino Buzzatti or Joachim Maria Machado de Assis. My interest sparked, I joined in with AM over the course of a year between May 2002 and 2003 as he revisited favorite books of his youth and later years. I was surprised to find Margret Atwoods early novel Surfacing among his later choices, and his take enriches my appreciation of the book, which I thought was sloppy, my least favorite Atwood, before she gained her mastery of words.

AM makes good use of his structure to spin off his own observations, ruminations and recollections, tying in the news of the day and semi-personal anecdote with what he is reading or has read . Impelled by his curious nature, these centre on literary anecdote, architecture, theology, poetry, history and biography with a depth of erudition and confidence that is matter of fact as it is eclectic apocryphal.
