As always Wendy hits the ground running. She just happens to be in the wrong place at the wrong time with hormones raging. Ms. Silkstone's plots are character driven and I am not sure she has any control over Wendy at all. She is a smart, take control type of heroine and doesn't let anything get in her way, besides holes in fabric, water in her face, or heights.

Miami Mummies is a homage to Alfred Hitchcock with character names such as Alfred Hiccup, Tippy Henman, Gary Grant, and Stewart James. Tippy's construction site, where the mummies were found, is the old Bates Hotel. In a secondary plot Alfred Hiccup, Wendy's mentor, recruits her to repossess, it's not stealing if it was originally stolen from him, a bronze Remington statue that has been located in the lobby of the Cowboy Pension Fund on the top floor of the North by Northwest Financial Center in Miami. You can tell Ms. Silkstone had a lot of fun weaving this story and the Hitchcock elements together. I found myself chuckling through it all.

This is not just slapstick humor, there is a good mystery, unscrupulous political figures, evil lobbyists, a spoiled heiress, and a radical spinoff tribe of Seminole Native Americans trying to protect what may be an old Tequesta Indian burial site. Unfortunately, Roger Jolley is away on other mummy business involving the world's most notorious mummy thief, Kyzer Saucy, who wishes to totally eliminate Roger by crafting an exotic demise. However, when he hears about the archaeological finds around Miami he joins Wendy in her quest to get to the truth about the Miami mummies.

I was glad to see more of Kit Kennedy in this book. He is a lot of fun to have around. I did fear for his safety a time or two through some of the plot twists. Ms. Silkstone does an excellent job bringing her story to life using recent headlines in Miami's news while making it a fun romp through Alfred Hitchcock's movie portfolio. There are a couple of new characters introduced who may make appearances in future books, it will be interesting to see. There is no cliffhanger at the end of this story but some things were not tied up in a neat little bow leaving openings for further adventures.

FYI: Miami Mummies is the fourth book in the Wendy Darlin Tomb Raider series.

While it could be read as a stand-alone I would recommend reading Wendy and the Lost Boys, London Broil, and Cairo Caper for a complete appreciation of the characters.

It is apparently my week for outré mysteries, those that combine strong and funny characters, near slapstick comedy and some classic references that will keep you thinking, guessing and giggling throughout.

Miami Mummies brings back the iconic and slightly obsessive Wendy Darlin and her on and off paramour

Roger Jolley in yet another improbable mystery. Bringing us a new character in a former classmate and real estate client, Tippy Henman. Tippy intends to fulfill a promise to her father by building a hi-rise on the land, yet that isn't going to happen with murder, mayhem and mummies appearing.

Completely off kilter, Wendy has to split her attention between her health issues and the struggle to add to her little family, the story moves from tomb to womb and back again as Wendy is trying to stay one step ahead of the people who are trying to kill her, while still managing to keep Roger in hand and focused. With the return of Kit as Wendy's best friend and the emergence of Wendy's mentor Alfred Hiccup (Hic), along with several references to the works of Hitchcock himself, there are several moments of "oooh, I remember that" mixing with the laughs.

I chuckled and then laughed out loud often, from the subtle dry wit to outright slapstick ridiculousness, the story just ran from one high point to another until the conclusion. Silkstone is clever and funny, and the writing is tight and polished, with characters coming forward and demanding their moment in the spotlight.

My Review

Four hours and twenty three minutes of sheer, feel good entertainment. If you like your crime stories puffed, well push off somewhere else, this book is funny.

The story has two crazy and outrageous main themes, the first begins with spoiled little heiress Tippy, she wants to build a high rise, she wants to do it now and doesn't see why she should go to all the time and trouble to deal with petty little hurdles such as searches and permissions. Despite being Tippy Henman she discovers that no, she is not entitled to skip formalities, so when remains are discovered on the site, work has to stop and the archeologists move in. What they find ensures the start of a crazy, action packed adventure. Roger Jolley returns from his quest to foil the evil mummy thief Kyzer Saucy (who doesn't like Roger one little bit) to help Wendy sort it all out. Good luck with that Roger.

The second theme involves poor Wendys' attempts to fulfil a promise, and that is to assist friend and mentor Alfred Hiccup with his (wait for it) transmigratory plan, and a very good plan it is too.

Hitchcock fans will note the references to his work, after all, it is a tribute to him! It's so clever though, how they are woven in to the story.

This is the fourth instalment of the Wendy Darlin adventures (I haven't read the others) but it is intended to be a stand-alone book. Wendy is a real estate broker dealing in expensive mansions in the Miami area. She has an on-off relationship with a prominent archaeologist called Roger Jolley who is a Johnny Depp look-alike. Hmm, that's a stroke against him in my book, however ...

The story begins promisingly enough with plenty of energy and an intriguing scene: Wendy finds her high-school pal and client Tippy Henman in a parking lot, splattered with blood and standing over a man with a knife in his chest. Wendy calls 911 (a favourite activity of hers to the point that one wonders why she doesn't have them on speed-call) and runs to support a fainting Tippy. When the police arrive, they misread the situation and start treating Wendy as the assassin. This allows for plenty of smart-ass repartee and establishes Wendy as a spirited heroine with a penchant for getting into trouble and the Miami police as bumbling idiots.

Amusing up to a point and I'm sure it's a cultural thing, but I did not find the humour that compelling. Silkstone has a way with words, she can twist a sentence and inject irony and sarcasm into the most mundane of situations, but it felt like she was tickling my ribs, willing me to laugh, and it wasn't happening. Sorry, Barbara! I appreciate the intent but it didn't fully succeed with me. There is nothing really wrong with the story. It clips along at a good pace, there are plenty of sideshows and each character has a well-defined personality. It's just that it's so predictable, the caricatures are so unimaginative, and the clichés so tired. I got bored of Wendy's endless brand name-checking and stopped caring how many fake nails she had broken while she swung between her dual personality incarnations: ditzy fashion-slave teetering on high heels, to Indiana Jones action-heroine jumping into rivers and on moving planes. I knew from the start that Wendy and I have nothing in common, but completely lost interest after her quip about a Vera Wang wardrobe. The Alfred Hiccup side story was silly and the plot twist was telegraphed so far in advance that it completely lost any impact.

As a friend of mine aptly put it, it's all about expectations. With all the promotion and high praise for this series, my expectations were high. The actual book was a let down. It's not horrible, just very average. It just depends on your sense of humour.
