Beyond that, the heroine in the book was a member of the Legion of Wenches (in the real world known as "The International Wenches Guild") The funniest part of that?

She's never been to a renaissance faire.

Seriously, who joins the Wenches' Guild without ever having been to a faire and without knowing what you're getting into? I mean, her cousin talked her into it, but still, the internet is available. The hero is very bland. There's not much to his personality other than the fact that he has a "dreamy" British accent.
