REVIEW: This is the second book in the Sadie's Montana series. I have cut back on the amount of Amish fiction I read as I began to find so many of them very formulaic. But I found the first in this series great, and Linda Byler continues her standard in this second of the series. The characters have much more depth and the

storyline is much more complex. The two main characters, Sadie and Mark, are polar opposites; but the attraction is still there. Mark has deeply buried pain from his experiences growing up which makes him doubt his ability to trust and his faith. Sadie has come from a close knit, loving family and hopes her love and faith can break through the brick wall with which Mark is surrounding himself. The plot line involves mystery and family issues which Byler weaves into the main story line very well. I look forward to reading the next in this series.

KEEPING SECRETS is the second book in Ms. Byler's Sadie's Montana series and readers will want to read the first book Wild Horses first as the books do not stand alone.

My thoughts, I wish Sadie would've encouraged the relationship with Daniel. I also wished she would've heeded the warnings her mother and father and co-workers and others gave her about Mark. But she didn't listen. There is a bit of a mystery -- who is the sniper killing the horses and why? Will Sadie be able to help Anna with her problems?

KEEPING SECRETS is not a well written book. The author head hops, switching points of view from one sentence to the next sometimes. We're in everyone's head, so I guess it could be called omnipotent point of view. It rather annoyed me at times, and sometimes I got so angry with Sadie I wanted to throw the book across the room.
