3 Stars

Story concept- A different twist on the supernatural and paranormal.

Suspense- Pretty decent job of shoring up a little mystery while setting the stage for larger mysteries to come in later books.

Ease of reading-It was quick to get through, only a few days worth of reading.

2 or less Stars

Action- This was ALL over the place. I got the impression that I was reading a second book in a series, or that I had missed a primer somewhere. Characters, plot points, back stories, were all referenced with an air of having been previously described so we here, but not anywhere I had read. A little more setup at the start would have gone a long way to smoothing over some of this.

Editing- Maybe it is because the author is Scottish, maybe because these were (I think?) self published, but the flow of the sentences was off to me too many times. Most notably there were commas where commas did not belong, and there were a large number of them. It was distracting.

Characters-Like the action, they were all over the place. Some were very well developed, others weren't. I also thought Iona was a hot mess more often than not. I get the whole coming in to her powers thing, but she buckled under pressure a little too often.

Setting-It's Scotland! Why not spend a little more time detailing the buildings and surroundings and the land? Maybe it's just me and not everyone likes that stuff.

I would not have chosen this book on my own, it was for one of my book groups. I liked the story enough that I'll probably give the second one an attempt to see if it's worth sticking with.
