I'm seriously torn between 2 and 3 stars. For most of this book I vacillated between WTF? and Really?

The book starts off with a flashback. Max and Emily have been inseparable for all four years of college. She thinks he is going to propose after graduation, but instead, he breaks up with her - with a whole "I need to be free" speech.

So for 18 months she is all:

Seriously, she is thrashed, and over a year later, she seems just as raw as when it first happened.

Then she meets Dr. Jake Reid. He is handsome, and rich and smitten. And honestly, he would need to be smitten, because some of the shit that comes out of her mouth on their dates- rude and bitchy in the extreme! (for no apparent reason) Although they have been "dating" for around 6 weeks, they have only had 4 dates, all of which were interrupted at some point because he got called into the hospital (he is a cardiac surgeon) She comes off as seriously unappealing - I totally don't get Jake's attraction (she waxes on about her ex, complains about everything, comments on his money all the time..)
