Meg Langslow and her boyfriend are preparing to renovate the rambling Victorian country house they bought, but first, they have to get rid of everything the previous owner left. This, they're doing by hosting a massive, multi-family yard sale, and Meg has been going crazy organizing everything, and fending off all the people who try to sneak in early (their vicious furball of a dog, Spike, mostly solves that problem). Everything is going as well as can be expected for an even so huge, but then, a body is discovered in a trunk, and the police have to suspend the yard sale. The body is a local antiques dealer whom Meg calls Gordon-You-Thief, and no one is really sad to see him go. Problem is, the police have arrested a colleague of Michael's, and worse, one who is on his tenure committee. Meg knows she has to find the real murderer, so

sets off sleuthing. Meanwhile, the crowd shut out of the yard sale starts up a new one in the front yard, and every time Meg looks, something else has been added--food trucks, choirs, costumes, sheep...it's almost becoming a literal circus! And then there are the owls...

I keep saying this series is such fun, because it is. It is so ridiculous and over the top, you just can't wait to see what unbelievable thing will happen next. This would make a great TV show. The middle, however, dragged a lot. Again, confession time - I was home for three days in cold, rainy weather with a sick two year old, so perhaps it was my attitude and lack of sleep, not the story, that was depressed. But it just seemed to loose it's sense of fun. Meg stressed out about everything and she and Michael practically argued about Meg's attitude toward her Mother. (Michael and Meg never argue.) Fortunately it picked up again in the final third. Shades of "The Trouble with Harry" had me smiling, and the final solution really surprised me. Meg is conducting the yard sale to end all yard sales - literally. Their new house, a falling-apart relic previously inhabited by a hoarder, has to be emptied before it can be renovated.

Behind Meg's back, her father and brother have put about the rumor that there may be a pirate's hoard concealed among the junk, and the town population pretty much relocates to Meg and Michael's yard. This offers plenty of suspects for the murder of a very unpopular antique dealer, so why do the police have to home in on a friend important to Michael's career? Meg has almost as much determination on the trail as their unwelcome-but-useful dog Spike.

Almost lost in the hilarious mayhem are Meg's adventures in a dumbwaiter, the non-burglary in the murdered man's shop, and the unopportunistic moments that various pieces of the house choose to fall off.

This book finally deals with the house Meg and Michael ended up buying at the end of book 4. The main character, Meg, is a mess of emotions. After all this

time, she has resentment against her mother for being model-worthy beautiful compared to herself. She resents Michael for putting most of the responsibility for the house on her (before it was making her move, having to deal with his mother, etc.). She's always eyeing other men and entertaining the idea of what-might-have-been. She resents her family for making demands on her time. All this, and she never seems to stand up for herself and tell all these people taking advantage of her to take a hike. Instead, she pastes a smile on her face and tries to be pleasant. Another great fun adventure with Meg, Michael, and her family. This time Meg and Michael have moved into the fixer-upper home of the late Mrs Sprocket. They bought the house "as-is" with the condition that anything they sell, 10% goes to the Sprocket family. Because of this the Sprocket's have been hounding them and trying to wring any penny they can out of Meg and Michael. It didn't help that the house, sheds, and barn were packed full of nick-nacks and other junk. So Meg decided to have a yard sale, and her family thought it was a great idea so they all joined in with their things to sell. It almost sounded like it had become it's own flea-market or fair-type event.

So the book starts with the day of the yard sale. People keep showing up early and the house is full of family members (and Sprocket squatters) getting ready for the sale. But there is no furniture in the house or the Sprocket's will claim it's theirs and demand payment.

It's the usual chaos that only Andrews has the perfect ability to make funny, charming, and entertaining to

read. We have Meg's dad obsessed over the owls in the barn. And everything is going relatively well when Gordon-you-Thief (a well known local antique dealer, whom is loathed by everyone) turns up dead in a trunk. Giles Rathbone, one of Michael's fellow professors at the university, is the prime suspect because he had been the last one holding the bookends Gordon-You-Thief was murdered with. Michael likes Giles (and Giles is Michael's best chance of making tenure) so Meg was determined to clear him.

So it's the usual adventure of Meg doing her sleuthing (pissing off the local police force, Chief Burke as she did last time) but finally figuring out what happened and who did it. She narrowed down her suspects and realized it was Barrymore Sprocket (the Sprocket who squatted in the house for the yard sale) and discovered he was on parole and was bad news. But THEN she realized it wasn't Sprocket, he just stole the money from the yard sale. Turns out it really was Giles who murdered Gordon-you-Thief. Giles almost killed Meg but Michael showed up in time to save her.

Another fun book. Meg is getting pressured by Michael to get married, and it sounds like Meg is coming around to the idea. Looking forward to what comes next!
