This enjoyable book is a little uneven in its pacing, but on the whole, it's a entertaining novel.

The plot moves along at a rapid pace- midway through the book, our heroes have found the quested-for unicorns and are headed home with them. The second half of the book drags a bit; there's a lot of descriptive passages about the ongoing war with the planet's mysterious Others, but the plot doesn't advance much. The book ends somewhat abruptly, and while it's set up for subsequent sequels, there's no cliffhanger.

The world and character building moves as rapidly as the plot. Supporting characters come and go quickly, and the protagonists are established very early on and go through minimal development. The world is interesting enough and familiar (eg magic, kings, etc) without being overly trite.

Overall, it's an enjoyable read for any fantasy fan.
