I enjoyed these books. I say books because this is the sequel to *Beggars and Choosers* and you really do have to read that book first. *Unfinished Business* begins with the boys living their new life as a couple and too much of the story would be confusing or have much less meaning without seeing their beginning.

Brett and Cory are very sweet and loving together. They appreciate what they have and genuinely enjoy each other. They have their misunderstandings and angsty moments, but they highly value their relationship. Not that they didn't have their detractors and people trying to break them up.

These boys are hot! The sex is intense and adds to the storyline. It's fun to watch the boys explore the pleasure and fun to be found in lovemaking. Their limited experience doesn't hold them back from trying new things with each other.

How do I say this? Brett talks funny. He has his own special spelling and I never did figure out what kind of accent he has. I adjusted after a while and found that it gave each character a distinct voice. There was no confusing him with anyone else, with the narrative alternating between Brett and Cory, that became important.

These boys are survivors. They have been through so much, both together and individually. This picks up where *Beggars and Choosers* left off, with Cory & Brett moving to University. Brett is managing the bar near campus while Cory attends classes & makes sure to be available to escort Cory home when classes are finished. Cory starts to make new friends & become more comfortable around other people until he begins getting threatening emails which he keeps from Brett because he believes it will keep Brett safe. This mistaken belief gets Cory put in danger again, hence the "unfinished business".

Issues I had: Brett's constant use of "boy" when referring to Cory. I find it extremely creepy since Cory is 19 & now an adult. Ian's insistence that there's no possible way Brett could be gay since he doesn't fit any of the gay stereotypes. What kind of bigoted ignorance is that? People don't fit all nicely in stereotypical boxes. Whether they are gay or het or bisexual or whatever. What a douchebag. If Brett had to be labeled, I would describe him as demisexual. Cory acting TSTL about the emails. This story is part of a series and must be read in order. Brett and Cory are starting their new life together, Cory is in college and Brett is the manager of a bar, they have their little apartment and their love for each other. But not everything is perfect, Cory lets his doubts about Brett get the better of him, with his 'not so' secret admirer feeding Cory doubts; can Brett really know what he wants when he has never been with a man before? Brett can see that Cory is hiding something, but it is much worse than he feared, can Brett help Cory protect himself before it's too late or will Cory's past catch up with him.

It isn't very often that I read a book and I fall madly in love with a character, but Brett stole my heart with his incredible love for Cory. Cory and Brett have already been through hell together in *Beggars and Choosers* and in this story they are starting their new life together, Brett is settling into his new job and Cory is starting college, they both have a security in the other and want nothing more than the other. But Cory begins to have doubts about Brett's gayness when Ian, his lab partner and wannabe-lover, tries to drive a wedge between them. Brett does his best to prove his love for Cory with his every breath, he does his best to protect him and knowing that Cory needs it, he encourages Cory to learn to protect himself.

Mia Kerick has written a wonderful story of true love, haunting danger and trying to protect those you love,

while adding in finding confidence in yourself and trusting those you love. Cory is a character that needs protection, but feels that he has to protect others, with Brett's encouragement he discovers a part of himself that he thought he had lost. Brett never wanted anyone but Cory and feels like he has failed when Cory has doubts about him; he also has to deal with his jealousy when Cory is pursued by another student. All the characters we meet are great with some of them standing out more than others, but they all make this story interesting.

Mia Kerick's Unfinished Business is a good blending of romantic fairy tale and the realities of being in a relationship. The story gave the reader a good picture of how ideal love would try to stay authentic in the real world. The title is a clue to the reader about past events in a previous book, as this is the sequel to Beggars and Choosers, but Ms. Kerick offered quick background explanations for first-timers meeting Brett Taylor and Cory Butana so the newbies could get into this part of their life with just short references to their old one.

Cory and Brett were very optimistic about their future together - Brett was doing very well in his new job, and Cory was making staunch friendships in college. Their relationship was deepening, and they grew to understand each other even more. But like any relationship, there were a few snags along the way - pretty much most of the female student body couldn't take their eyes (and for some of them, their hands) off Brett, and there was a contingent of Cory admirers determinedly trying to put a wedge between them that were

putting doubts in Cory's mind. More perilous however was a trauma from the past that Cory would rather forget, and that inattention compounded the danger. Try as he might to ignore it, it threatened their idyllic setup, causing the lovers to keep secrets from each other and to misunderstand their intentions. If they didn't find a way to meet it head-on, Cory might be taken from Brett permanently.

My first impression as I read was, "this is too ideal a relationship". The author made it work however - readers like me were helped to suspend their disbelief by the emphasis on how the damaged psyches of the protagonists interacted with the 'perfect' romance. Sure, Brett and Cory were dedicated to each other in ways almost unheard of in the real world, but a lot of that dedication was fueled by the damage wrought by formerly messed-up lives, giving their relationship a flavor of co-dependency. Brett's lingering nightmares from having such a terrible childhood and Cory's intense fear of being left alone gave depth and logical explanation to the veneer of a perfect romance, and made its existence easier to swallow. But after using such damaged psyches to explain the perfect relationship, Ms. Kerick surprised me by using the same personalities forged by such messed-up lives to transcend a likely outcome like co-dependency and return the relationship to the romantic ideal I realistically scoff at but secretly hope exists for a happy couple somewhere in the world. That was a good trick - it kept me consistently engaged and reading till the end, and yet preserved the fairy tale quality that would have made me lose interest in the beginning!

For readers of gay fiction and readers fond of romance, this is a recommended read - but they would already know that, especially if they had read the first book. For readers looking for a good story and those interested in seeing how a fairy tale can be incorporated into an engaging, suspenseful, heartstring-tugging contemporary romance, Mia Kerick's *Unfinished Business* is a very good read.

The story is told using the alternating POVs of Brett and Cory (and occasionally some of the secondary characters). I've read plenty of books where alternating POVs are utilized and do not work at all, however that is definitely not the case here! Same goes for literal use of dialect/accent. The author in this instance utilizes alternating POVs and a strong dialect (Brett) with absolute sterling results. Each character has a distinct voice and with Brett especially, I felt as though they were sitting right in front of me telling their story. Brett's voice, and, – let's face it – Brett overall, won my heart in *Beggars and Choosers* and that feeling was definitively solidified in this sequel.

This story begins with Brett and Cory moving into a cozy studio apartment together near the campus where Cory will be attending college. They have an awesome purple comforter on their bed. Brett has secured a job managing a bar/restaurant on campus. Due to the assault on Cory the previous summer, Brett is protective of

Cory and always walks him to and from each class, to the library, and to the apartment, even scheduling time away from the bar to do so. Cory absolutely consents to this and doesn't consider it as controlling at all. In fact, it really touched my soul to hear their inner dialogues about what this level of care and concern meant to each of them.

New people that meet Cory and Brett don't necessarily see this behavior as loving, nor do they know the history behind it. Ian – an attractive, spiky haired, dressed all-in-black dude, who takes an immediate interest in getting to know Cory better – sees Brett's constant "bodyguard" routine as smothering, controlling, and possibly bullying....
