Jocelyn, however, finds clearing her friend's name far more important than the needs of a pesky movie crew and doesn't care who knows it. But it's only when she's attacked while on set that she realizes someone is determined to make sure the secrets hidden by Fred's death remain hidden no matter what the cost.

Jocelyn hears the loud voices of what appears to be an abusive confrontation between Fred Argus, fellow teacher as well as the tennis coach and a typical unrealistic parent who thinks his freshman son should be team captain (Really?) and she rushes in where others fear to tread confronting this angry blustering man as if he were an errant school boy himself. This approach is effective and the situation is resolved but aptly named Fred Argus is not behaving in his usual manner and he leaves for home.

The next time Jocelyn saw Fred was on the floor of the tennis shed, lying with his milky white eyes blankly open surrounded by some tennis balls. Fred was an older man in his sixties who was a teacher as a second career. Despite being a coach he was known for his spindly white legs and his two pack a day smoking habit. Jocelyn knew him to be an excellent teacher and she credited him with teaching her more than she learned in all her formal years of education with regard to how to impart knowledge to the teenage mind.

Despite the fact that the police are called it is natural to assume that this death was a natural one and although Jocelyn is deeply saddened the pressing issues of the first day of school is upon them. Aside from her own classes she is expected to help her look alike cousin Kyla teach a course to girls about technology as part of a community service program. It doesn't take long for it to become clear that this death is really a murder. Before the day is out she finds that she is also the new interim tennis coach.

But Jocelyn is not too busy to realize that that Fred had been on the trail of some wrong doings and as she begins to investigate she puts herself in danger. The clues are there for the reader to join in the hunt for the murderer. He will murder again before he is through.

This is a lively fast paced story with an excellent cast of characters. The setting is a bit unlike high school as I knew it, but hey, the times they do change. This book was a quick, easy read, with an exciting murder mystery which kept me on my toes. Jocelyn Shore's life turns upside-down the minute Fred Argus is found dead in the school tennis shed. After a rumor starts that Fred's murder was the result of a drug deal gone wrong, Jocelyn makes it her mission to clear his name. This only leads to more trouble as she is thrown into a twisted web of lies, blackmail and embezzlement.

The story could have very easily become predictable but it didn't. I was kept guessing every second of the way and I could never quite pinpoint who the perpetrator was. Each suspect was creepy in their own way, and they all seemed to have the means and motives for wanting Fred dead. When Jocelyn falls victim to a brutal crime, she wonders if it's just coincidence or is it related in any way to Fred's death, and if so, why has the killer's attention turned to her? Could it have something to do with the note Fred left for her, or is her snooping causing more trouble than she expected?

I really enjoyed playing private investigator alongside Jocelyn. She is such a fun character. She's witty and smart, and doesn't hate herself in any particular way, which seems to be a trait of most characters these days. The only time she ever really puts herself down is when comparing herself to Kyla, her cousin and BFF. Speaking of Kyla, she is just as fun a character as Jocelyn. The banter between the two was so real and I could almost imagine sitting right next to them as they spoke about men, guns and alcohol. Although Kyla can be a bit self-centered and rude at times, especially when she and Jocelyn are likened to each other, I still thought she was a wonderful friend in times of need.

On top of everything else Jocelyn has to deal with, she is forced to battle the feelings she develops for the gorgeous, "knight in shining armor" detective Colin Gallagher while still trying to figure out her long distance relationship with Alan Stratton. All I can say is that I'm Team Colin all the way.

The second Jocelyn Shore mystery is just as much fun as the first, just as lyrical and comic, just as well written. You have to do without the magic of Egypt, but Janice Hamrick can create her own magic in her native Austin, Texas. Building A of Bonham High is as gloomy and foreboding as any ancient temple complex. But there is a big difference in the books: in *Death on Tour* there is so much fun to be had, you can think of the whodunnit format as an extra bonus, while in *Death Makes the Cut* you are drawn into the mystery on page 1, and become almost as desperate as Jocelyn for the answer. The reader is remorselessly sucked down into a vortex of terror ...

... well, that's putting it too strongly. Let's say it's comedy-horror. Perhaps not unlike *Teenage Fangst*, the movie in which, by an extraordinary chain of circumstances, Jocelyn makes a startling and involuntary cameo appearance, itself a quite perfect combination of rich comedy and shrieking horror.

Jocelyn grows on us with every page. This is despite her severe limitations as a detective, which I'm sure she'd be the first to admit. Sherlock Holmes would have thought her even denser than Watson. (And the massive workload dumped on her in the oversized, under-resourced school where she works is sufficient excuse for the slow pace of her sleuthing.) But her natural courage, sense of justice, and feline curiosity amply compensate for reduced deductive powers and occasional lapses of plain common sense.

Jocelyn's cousin Kyla also grows on us. For me, the Jocelyn-Kyla interaction is the best thing in these books. A perfect example of those woman-woman relationships that an extreme left-brained male like myself can study and observe, but never really understand, like an unimaginative zoologist investigating the mating behaviour of exotic animals.

I especially had an issue with Jocelyn's cousin Kyla. So Death Makes the Cut sat on my TBR pile for quite some time before I made myself pick it up today. I'm awfully glad I did - a great improvement in my opinion! Kyla still has moments of shallowness, but she's *much* more likeable and it's now more evident why she's Jocelyn's best friend as well as family. The story line is also greatly enhanced by the introduction of Detective Colin - a romantic interest a person can get excited about! I know Alan is everything that is good and right in a man, but he didn't seem to have that spark of machismo that makes the love interest in these books so interesting. Having said that, I hope this is NOT the beginning of some silly love triangle that is only going to piss me off and turn me off the books.

The murder plot was well done - the suspects are all obvious, but it's never clear exactly who the murderer is until the end. I was pretty sure I knew, but never ready to say "X did it!" definitively. And I wouldn't have been totally correct anyway.

ABSOLUTELY LOVED IT

Jocelyn is back in Austin, ready to start the uneventful school year as she has planned, teaching French and History. Well, it doesn't do according to her lesson plan when she finds her mentor and fellow History teacher, Fred, dead in the school's tennis office. Enlisted to take over as tennis coach, she thinks the police

aren't doing enough to catch the killer, especially when the police suspect him of selling drugs. Jocelyn thinks those drugs were planted by the killer and wants to clear his name. The detective, Colin, assigned to the case, questions her and some of those questions become personal. As Kyla, Jocelyn's cousin notes, Colin is hunky and hot -- my words not hers, but you get the point. Since Jocelyn is now in a long distance relationship with Alan, Kyla thinks that Jocelyn needs to date someone local and Colin couldn't agree more. Also, a famous director, Michael Dupre, is using the high school as a film site and rings in Jocelyn's tennis team as extra which absolutely fries the drama teacher, Roland, since he would love nothing more than audition for the director to get his big break. While the kids are filming, Jocelyn is attacked and ends up in the hospital and when she is finally released, she finds her home burglarized and trashed. Colin comes to the rescue and puts her on surveillance. As Jocelyn collects more clues to Fred's murder, her best friend and fellow teacher, Laura, finds a few suspicious things about the drama department and the school's finances. Jocelyn warns Laura not to get too nosy because of what happened to her and things don't go well for Laura as she uncovers more dirt about the school accountant, Pat.

My favorite line is the story is when Laura, described as tiny, tries to drag Jocelyn to see something in the school's theatre: "She tugged at me, trying to pull me after her. It was a little like a dachshund trying to move a fully loaded Yukon sled." I bet you can guess why this is my favorite! This is a fast paced and easy to read story, just perfect for the hot days of summer. I love that Jocelyn is not perfect and just like a dachshund, she tends to stay on scent, even though her logic knows she should just give up on the hunt for the killer. Everything is believable and right down to the interactions with her cousin Kyla, students and other teachers just rings true.
