One Little White Lie is one of the launch titles for Random House Australia's new digital imprint, Random Romance. If this novella is anything to go by, it's going to be full of excellent titles – full of fun, humour, witty repartee and romance.

I recently reviewed Loretta Hill's The Girl in the Hard Hat and really enjoyed it. I was really interested to see how Hill would tackle a romance novel, given that her previous book focused on a great, underused setting (Western Australia's Pilbara region). I am pleased to say that this lady is GOOD – her characters absolutely sparkle off the page and into my heart. It's been a long time since I had a book character crush, but Henry fits the bill. Not only is he handsome, genuinely nice but he's an incredibly famous (but publicity shy) author. Kate is our heroine and she's no slouch either – she's currently writing her PhD thesis. I love that we have two intelligent characters as the protagonists – gives hope to us geeks!

Kate is sick of being hassled by her best friend over her continual single relationship status after a bad breakup with an evil surgeon. Frustrated, she tells Lisa that she does have a boyfriend – she's just waiting until the right moment to show him off. So it's a shock when her imaginary boyfriend greets her in person at a party! Henry insists that Kate give him a go, but he's hiding his megastar author status. Add in a bit of fisticuffs, a lot of missed opportunities and 'nearly!' moments. This is the perfect romantic comedy – in book form.

I would say that this is the best novella I've read. Usually, I feel somewhat cheated that we don't get to know the characters in depth and plot lines are left unexplored. Hill achieves this all brilliantly in such a concise way – I felt connected to the characters to the point where I think I'd know Kate if I ran into her on the street. Granted, there are not too many threads woven through this book (it is only 100 pages after all) but I felt that everything was tied up to my satisfaction.

I can confidently say that I'll read anything Loretta Hill writes from now on. Her ability to bring a smile to my face through her witty prose and character's adventures means she is an author to watch out for.

To be honest I barely read contemporary romances. I saw *One Little White Lie* on Netgalley, and decided to give it a try since I could use a short, fun novella.

In *One Little White Lie* Kate lies to her friend Lisa, and tells her she has a boyfriend. She would never find out that she was lying, right? But then Lisa tells Kate that she met the wonderful boyfriend, and everything gets very confusing.

I very much enjoyed this novella. The story catalyst is quite predictable, but Ms Hill handles the subject wonderfully. Kate is just as surprised as anyone when her fake boyfriend joins her at a party, and I found the situation hilarious. It was all well written, and had this romantic comedy movie feel.

The only thing I didn't like about the book was the point of view of the fake boyfriend. The moment he lays eyes on Kate, he thinks she's an angel and he just wants to know her. He instantly identifies her as the love of his life, the woman he will stay with. I found this completely unrealistic. I wish he just found her beautiful and that he wanted to get to know her better - this was just a bit too much weird-stalker behaviour for me. I didn't let this influence my rating too much because I know this is make-believe. This is how women *want* men to think, which doesn't necessarily have to be realistic.

The hurdles the couple has to overcome *are* quite realistic though. It's nice that not all of a sudden everything is perfect between them. They both have issues to overcome, and it takes them a while to come to terms with everything.

One Little White Lie is an entertaining novella that can easily be read in one sitting. Perfect for your daily dose of escapism and romance.

Kate's best friend Lisa is determined to see that Kate is as happy and loved up as she herself is and tries to keep fixing Kate up with men, everywhere. After a random meeting at a bar turns out to be nothing of the sort, Kate loses her temper and finally tells Lisa to back off and stop setting her up, because she already has a boyfriend. She just hasn't told anyone because it's new and she was keeping it secret to see how things went.

Henry has always wanted to meet someone just as himself, not as a name that sells a lot of books. With Kate he has that chance, but all secrets have to come out eventually...

One Little White Lie is a cute and fun novella from Loretta Hill, best selling author of The Girl In Steel-Capped Boots and The Girl In The Hard Hat. Here Loretta heads away from the Pilbara and remote locations and sets her story in a city. Kate is a PhD student, still working on her thesis and still reeling from a bad break up. What makes things worse is that her ex is still in her life and never loses an opportunity to put her down or make her feel an inch high. She has trust issues, which makes it hard to relax when she meets someone and she's tired of being set up.

Henry wrote a trilogy which outsold just about everything else on the market and is being made into a movie. As a result of this and his new found wealth, he often finds that women aren't interested in him, just his pen name and his money. When he meets Kate, he sees a chance for a woman to get to know the real him – and he gets to spend time with the woman that intrigued him from the very first time he laid eyes on her. There's quite an attraction between Kate and Henry but they both have some obstacles and baggage to overcome first.

I couldn't help but relate to Kate. I've been her, the single friend that people often pity! I never had anyone attempt to matchmake me though, and had anyone tried, especially to the extent that Lisa was going to, I'd have lost my temper very quickly. Sometimes you need time to get over a bad break-up! When Kate opens her mouth and the lie tumbles out, I felt for her. I thought it was sad that she needed to lie because her friend was not listening to her. However Kate also needed to let go of her bitterness and her trust issues and she was probably never going to be able to do that until she moved on, so I could see why Lisa wanted her to be open

minded to meeting someone and trying to find some happiness again with another person.

Being a shorter story, the relationship developing between Henry and Kate did feel a little bit rushed but I'm used to reading full length novels where things can take a lot longer! This was still a very fun, quirky story with some interesting characters that proved you can take Hill out of the Pilbara and she's still going to deliver.

One Little White Lie is a comic novella about white lies and how they can lead to much bigger things. Kate Dreson is young, gorgeous and single – thanks to her cheating ex-boyfriend, Mark. They were together for three years, but now Kate would much rather stay at home than risk being set-up by her best friend, Lisa. Although she means well, Lisa is a compulsive match-maker and, after being chatted-up by a drunk guy at a pub, Kate has decided that enough is enough. She vows to put an end to the match-making by inventing a boyfriend – her dream man.

Meanwhile, unbeknownst to Kate, this dream man has been enlisted by Lisa to pretend to be Kate's boyfriend. Henry is rich, handsome, and a very successful writer who just wants to find a girl who appreciates him for who he is, rather than one who is only after his money.

Here begins a comedy of errors of sorts, filled with a lot of meddling from Lisa and Henry's brother Tom. This is where the story got a bit frustrating for me as I didn't like the characters of Tom and Lisa much and I really just wanted them to leave Kate and Henry to get on with things themselves. I appreciate, of course, that this would not have happened if it weren't for the interferences, and that they drive the story and provide complications, but for Tom to go as far as having Kate investigated I think took things a bit too far. I felt sorry for Kate not being able to go anywhere without being potentially set-up by Lisa.

To further complicate matters, Henry is actually the elusive fantasy writer H.L.Carter. Wanting to see if Kate likes him for himself rather than his money, Henry doesn't tell her, even when she confides to him that H.L.Carter is her absolute favourite author of all time. Needless to say when Kate discovers the truth she is not very happy that Henry had kept this from her.

I liked the fact that, having both been burnt in previous relationships, Kate and Henry were as nervous and unsure as each other at the beginning of their relationship. Ultimately I believed in the connection between them.

One Little White Lie is a delightful little novella from one of Australia's best selling emerging author Loretta Hill. It's quick paced, light and a fairly entertaining read that is both similar and different from Hill's debut novel *The Girl in Steel Capped Boots* (2012) and her follow up *The Girl in the Hard Hat*(2013).

Unlike her current series of books set within the Pilbara, *One Little White Lie* is set in Sydney and follows the story of Kate, a dirt-poor university student who is struggling with relationship issues whilst completing her PHD. Having become almost a recluse following a bad relationship, Kate's best friend Lisa, a serial match-maker, is determined to get her back into the dating game, no matter the cost or methods. Constantly bombarded with blind dates and obvious set ups, Kate puts her foot down only to find herself in the biggest scheme Lisa has ever thought up, and all because of Kate's little white lie. Now with a pretend boyfriend who is requesting official dates and a chance, Kate finds herself walking a path she had never wanted to travel again.

The characters are alive and vibrant and it's hard not to be drawn into their little world. My only complaint is that having finished the novella now I want more. I loved being given a famous and handsome author as a male protagonist (Henry) and a strong independent female university student completing her PhD (Kate). In a way it was kind of a relief not to have ditzy characters that 'giggle' and 'blush' and bounce around all the time. All of which helped to not only create and set the scene, but also create an engaging story that becomes hard to put down. I know I didn't want too.

Initially I was interested to see how Hill's style would change given the format change (novels to novella) and the setting change (Rural to a more Urban setting) and ultimately I think Hill has pulled these both off. While its true that in terms of content, the issues faced in *One Little White Lie* are not as 'serious' and big as those in her novels, I don't think they are any less real or engaging. In fact, despite only being given a snap shot of Kate and Henry's lives and relationships, Loretta Hill deals really well with some of humanities more unflattering traits. A large portion of the novella deals with the types of shallow and ugliness that success can bring out in people. For "it seemed the more successful he got, the less sincere people became. He'd met a startling number since then who had basically wanted to know him for one of three things. Money. Fame. Status."

Ultimately the story's designed to be read in one setting, and true to form, it's an easy and entertaining read making it easy to do so. Like her previous work, this novella has everything a good chick lit/contemporary fiction novel has: feel good writing, dreamy characters and a beautiful love story and relationships. While she may not be tackling as big or problematic issues as she does in her novels, Loretta Hill still manages to explore basic human fears and relationships while casting light over some unattractive social traits. As usual, Loretta Hill proves once again not only why she is a best selling author, but also many readers guilty pleasures.
