As a Pens' fan, it was fascinating to discover the origin of the much-repeated taunt about Crosby diving (blame the Flyers) and disheartening to realize that several of the things Crosby knew he needed to work on during his rookie season (such as letting rival teams get him wound up to put him off his game) remain problems for him today.

In all seriousness:

I really want to give this book more stars, because it consistently held my interest, but the quality of the writing isn't quite there. It's very repetitive in spots (practically identical sentences only a few pages apart) and the timeline is occasionally hard to follow. Most of the book is chronological but every so often Richer throws in a chapter that focuses on an individual subject (eg the rookie scoring race between Crosby and Ovechkin) that spans the entire season or large parts of it, and it's difficult to mentally adjust. In one notable instance, she gives a quick rundown of the Olympics and then goes on to a play-by-play of the last game BEFORE the Olympic break. Sports journalism, ladies and gentlemen.

I think it's more of a question of poor editing than anything else. It's still better than most sports nonfiction I've read, and absolutely worth reading if the subject matter interests you.
