So, if you're looking for hot sex scenes, bodice ripping action and the conventional tropes one expects in a novel with a title such as this, then you're going to be very disappointed. There is no grand overt passion between the MC's. Instead, this story line develops more along the lines of a morality novella. It's a story that seeks to impart an important moral lesson; it's almost like a modern day regency fable (minus the use of animals as characters) in the novella format. The message that this novella seeks to disseminate is: Wealthy people also want to be loved for themselves and not for their affluence and influence. The H is Christopher Haskett, the young Duke of York and he longs for a bride who will love him for the man he is and not be a sycophantic gold digging title hunter like his late mother. The heroine Mary, is a young ingenue who hasn't yet made her first debut in Society. Mary's mother, Lady Eldridge, is the daughter of a Baron. Lady Eldridge is a social climber who has lived to regret her own marriage to a Mary's father, because the latter is a mere "Sir". Lady E has lofty ambitions for her beautiful daughter Mary.

Christopher receives permission to court Mary but he is adamant that her parents hide his ducal title from the

heroine. The H is tired of young women fawning over him merely because he is a duke. Mary has not had a suitor before Christopher and she is keen to learn everything about the dashing, handsome "Mr. Haskett". I loved the old fashioned courting that the H employed with Mary. It was so reminiscent of novels that were actually written by authors who lived in this historical era. That's what made this so original a novella in this specific sub genre of historical romance. Mary soon learns, from her busybody cousin Antoinette, that "Mr. Haskett" is the Duke of York. In her youthful enthusiasm, Mary blurts it all out to Christopher and he misinterprets her exuberance as sycophantic fawning. Christopher gets angry and ends his courtship of the heroine because he thinks she's just another title hunting gold digger.

Mary's depressed because she had grown to like him a lot but she resigns herself to accepting the end of his courtship. Lady E, however, doesn't take this decision so calmly. The older woman is determined to chase after the H and work herself back into his good graces. Lady E was supremely annoying and pushy. She came across as a stalker because she uses her temporary depression as an excuse to stalk Christopher to a seaside hospital on the Isle of Wight. The H is there visiting a childhood friend who suffers from a type of rheumatic disorder that targets young people. The duke feels stifled by Lady E's efforts to impose herself (and Mary) upon him and he ends up telling her off in a placid but rude manner. I felt sorry for Mary because she ended up being a collateral damage victim of her mother's social climbing ambitions. Mary eventually returns home and her father brings another suitor to court her. This guy is an overdressed Spanish dandy with greasy hair, who is shorter than the heroine. Mary is appalled but things work out in her favour since the Spanish guy is searching for a bride who will be a match for his flamboyant and loud personality.

The novella then has a major plot twist when the H turns up at Mary's home. This time he is unshaven and dressed in dirty, ragged clothing. He tells the Eldridges that he has lost his ducal fortune and is now bankrupt. He begs them to allow him to stay at their home for a while. Mary and her parents are very kind and welcoming to him and the MC's romantic relationship blossom once again. I found it weird that the snobbish and gold digging Lady E would be so accepting and kind of the H's poverty, especially when she agrees to allow him to marry Mary. The H tells Mary that all of his friends (and even women who had once chased after him) have abandoned him now that he is poor. Mary is not the slightest bit bothered by his poverty and is happy when he proposes marriage to her. Things soon deflate for the H, though, when he confesses that he had been pretending to be poor because he wanted to see if Mary will still want him as a husband. Mary gets angry and refuses to marry him, because she hates the fact that he had to resort to such trickery. The MC's eventually do get married after he apologizes for his trickery and lies.
