

Four months in Fish Creek Falls with her newly-opened bakery on an upswing, divorced Myra Bailey felt her life was on track until the unthinkable happened, she was arrested for murder. Barbara Simpson, owner of Barbara's Brilliance (a well-established, popular bakery in town) was dead with Myra's recipe card and chocolate cake at the crime scene, all evidence pointed to an open and closed case against her. Innocent and fearing the police stopped looking for the real killer, Myra along with her best friend Lizzie Stevens searched for clues to stop the cell door from permanently closing on Myra.

A short mystery with a good introduction to the characters, a tidbit of information on each of them was quickly revealed. The friendliness and the daily routine of a small town were spot on; the folksy feel was adorable, speaking as a person who grew up in a small town. With the even pace and moments of "cuteness", the story held an upbeat vibe about it. Dropping little clues along the way and with a nicely written fight scene, "Death by Chocolate" was a light mystery to be enjoyed for an afternoon. Death by chocolate? That title sure grabbed my attention! I've been in the mood for reading mysteries and thrillers, and cozy mysteries have been calling out to me the most. What better way to get into the genre than by reading a mystery book that is tied with chocolate too?

This was a quick yet delightful read. The author gave enough details to give the reader a sense of the type of world this story took place in. Fish Creek Falls was a small town where everybody knew everybody. There was only one bakery shop until Myra, the main character, moved into town and opened one up of her own. The few interactions that Myra had with various characters were well done too. I was able to picture the type of person each character was. Now, the problem of the story of learning who the real murderer was could have been stronger. I only suspected two characters out all of the ones that were intended to confuse the reader. However, it was still fun reading the climax of the story.

Though I enjoyed this cozy mystery, I did have a problem with the ending. First, the true motive of the murderer was too weak. I could have seen how this "motive" could have been enough for someone to commit murder (having a Hot Fuzz movie flashback...), but it would have been better if it was further explained. It turned out to be more petty than an actual motive. Next, the ending abruptly ended. Right after learning who the killer was, the story ended. Yup, just like that without any farewells to the reader. It wasn't even a cliff-hanger type of ending. It was as if the author gave up and refused to continue. It had me yelling, "What?! That's it?!" *sigh* I guess I was expecting a stronger resolution.

In all, this was not that bad. I was quite entertained from beginning to end. It was not perfect, but the book was able to grab my attention. It was a great way to get my toes wet into the cozy mysteries genre.
