Cover 8/10

In general, the cover is excellent. A strong image representing the content and genre, and easy-to-read fonts. I liked the look on the woman's face: thoughtful, a woman with the world on her shoulders.

The blurb is also well put together. The author/publisher seem to understand who the intended reader is (probably middle-aged women) and produced a cover and blurb to match.

Editing 10/10

I detected no punctuation, spelling or grammatical problems in this text. The sentence structure is, on the whole, excellent and the story keeps a good pace right up until the very end.

I would particularly like to comment on the speech. This is a character-driven novel and, as such, there is a lot of speech. The author works very well with this and it is always easy to understand who is saying what. The speech reflects the characters well and there is a perfect balance between speech and character/setting description.

Theme 9/10

This book is predominantly about a woman and her relationship with her mother. As such, it looks very much at the up and downs of such a relationship and the extent a mother would go to to save her child from harm.

But there is much more to this novel than that. The author brings the reader on an emotional journey; a journey of loss and love, betrayal and sickness. It even looks at the power of music as a form of therapy. This book is very 'touchy-feely'; it is not for a macho bricklayer or a spotty teenager. It is for women, and perhaps a few men, who can appreciate the wonders and horrors of being a mother and, at the same time, trying to be a woman too. It is written with an emotionally-filled pen and packs an emotionally powerful punch.

Style 9/10

I thought this book was very hard to put down. Being 42 and a mother myself, I found it very easy to relate to the central character and what she was going through. The simple prose was never 'too simple' and, although a few of the lesser characters could possibly do with a little more fleshing out, I was very quickly absorbed by the twists and turns of this woman's life..

To Sum Up 36/40

I would very much recommend this novel to any person but, in particular, to mothers. It really is beautifully written and many mums will find it easy to relate to Agnieszka and what she went through in her life. Having personally had a 'troubled' relationship with my own mother, I see much of the heroine of this book in me: a woman who wants to be loved by her mum but has no idea how to go about it.

Hello, Agnieszka! is the second book in the Between Two Worlds series by E Journey. I enjoyed the first book Hello, My Love! You can read my review [here](#). And now I look forward to reading the third book.

First, I'd like to say that I like the book covers of this series. This one is perfect for this novel as it depicts Agnieszka well with her story revolving very much around her passion for playing the piano. Even the serious expression on the woman's face is just right.

The story begins with the same main characters from Book One. When Elise's brother attempts suicide, her mother Agnieszka decides to gather her family and reveal a secret from her past. The story then shifts to Agnieszka's point of view and is told in the first-person. She begins her story when she was an eight-year old child.

Having read the first book in the series, I was a bit skeptic and hesitant to read this book, as I found the first to be a bit jumpy for my taste. Elise's story progressed way too fast for my taste. This book was one big surprise. Agnieszka's story was so heart wrenchingly beautiful and narrated with so much depth that Elise's story paled out in comparison. I don't regret one bit reading this book!

In the second book the writer, Evy narrates the story of Elise's mother – Agnieszka – a woman with enough courage to break through the societal stereotypes of the 70s. Lost dreams of being a pianist, heart break beyond control and parents who were too rigid – She handled it all and eventually lived through it. The choices that Agnes makes defines her life and leads to where she is now – a doting mother of three children who has managed to raise all of them with values and strength to handle even the toughest situation the life presents with.

~ I received a free softcover copy of "Hello, Agnieszka! - A 70s Love Story" free through the Goodreads Giveaway program. A review is not a requirement of receiving the free book, but the authors and publishers do appreciate receiving feedback (good or bad) from readers.

This is the second book in the "Between Two Worlds" series, however, it is not necessary to read the books in order since each one is its own stand-alone novel.

This book begins with the suicide attempt of a young adult named Peter. Fortunately the attempt was unsuccessful, but this single event triggers a tsunami of family revelations - all centred around Agnieszka.

The tale turns to the past and specifically to Agnieszka's life from age ten to twenty.

Agnieszka's Great Aunt Jola was a renowned beauty and pianist in her native Poland. However, she, along with Agnieszka's grandparents fled Poland and the Nazi invasion and emigrated to the United States. It was in the U.S. that Agnieszka was born.

At the age of ten Agnieszka heard Aunt Jola play the piano for the first time and she was captivated.

That love of music shaped her life for years to come. As a teenager in the early 1970s, you would think that Agnieszka would have been experiencing the "free love" era, but she was a very sheltered young woman and spent all of her time either at school, at home or practicing the piano. At the age of 17 she had never even had a boyfriend.

That all changes when she meets Lenny and falls deeply in love.

Betrayal and heartbreak, along with love, lust and a mother who is stuck in the past all conspire to change Agnieszka's life forever.

This is a tale of young love, first loves, heartbreaks and the power of music to soothe the soul.

If you are trying to decide whether or not to read this book, there are certain things that you need to take into consideration.

1. Are you looking for a steamy romance with detailed sex scenes? If so, this is NOT the book for you. Yes, there is sex in this book, but the act itself is secondary to the story and the author obviously decided that graphic sex scenes were unnecessary. In my opinion, this is a good thing. This book seeks to appeal to the reader's heart, much more so than their libido.
2. Are you looking for a modern day setting? Again, if that is the case, this is NOT the book for you. But, if you want to read a story that is set in the 1970s during an era of change and exploration, this is EXACTLY the book for you.
3. Do you enjoy superficial characters that are completely lacking in depth and that readers are unable to

relate to? That is the exact opposite of the characters in "Hello, Agnieszka." The author's character building is excellent. Readers learn more and more about each character as the story emerges and readers will find themselves beginning to be invested in the lives of Agnieszka, Lenny and Aunt Jola.

4. Are you looking for a book that contains only simple and straightforward emotions? If so, this is NOT the right choice for you. The emotions and actions of the characters in this book are complicated and often perplexing, but always realistic.

So, in conclusion, this book is more of a drama than a romance. Yes, the romance is central to the story, but it is about much more than that.

I enjoyed this book and will definitely read more books by author, E. Journey in the future.

### **BOOK REVIEW:**

A good blurb, a story about music (and its healing powers) and a poignant tale of young love (unsuccessful, but still) are part of a winning combo that would surely make any book a bestseller. Hello, Agnieszka! Is a tale of all this put together. Having already read book one,(Hello, my Love!) this one was satisfactory to all my expectations from the author.

The story starts with a tragic note and goes down the memory lane to bring back things that are hidden in the deepest, darkest corner of one's mind only to be perused in the twilight of poignant recollections. Not going much into the actual story, it is everything the summary promises it is.

A daughter's troubled relationship with her mother and the pain of scandal, betrayal and the true loss of one's first love are portrayed in the author's usual beautiful style. While the story itself is set in the 70s, the connection would be better to understand if the books of the series are read in the order they have been published. (Some might disagree and call this a prequel, and even others might call this a standalone, though both may be true, my personal opinion is that this book is best read second in the series).

The language is good (only a few typos and phrasing errors). But when a story is too emotional, and there are deep thoughts shared, the language breaks slink away unnoticed. Bittersweet tales are difficult to carry off. There can never be enough justification to satisfy the behaviour of every character (from the aunt to the mother to the main character) but basically, this story is a deep analysis on the strong bonds of human relations.

Maybe because I am still thinking about book 1, or maybe because I am still wondering about Elise and Greg, this story gets second place in my most favourite book of the series list.

This sequel to author E. Journey's *Hello, My Love!*, opened with quotes by Hermann Hesse and Pablo Casals about holding on and music, begins with the newly-married Elise Halverson-Thorpe analyzing a client's testimony, with her father calling with the grim news that Peter has been hospitalized and had attempted suicide, supposedly being ill with a debilitating disease. Elise and Greg have a child named Gregory, nicknamed Goyo, a Spanish diminutive for his identity, and who participates with his father in various actions such as jogging and kite-flying.

In the third chapter, the story takes a sudden change in setting to the past, which this reviewer found out after perusing the book's Amazon page to be the 1970s, with little reference to contemporary events such as the Vietnam War, and where the chief protagonist, the daughter of Polish immigrants named Agnieszka, called Ania for short by her family or its English equivalent, Agnes, as an affectionate moniker, begins her narration of the bulk of the story's chapters. She dreads her daily doses of cod liver oil, and ultimately begins to take piano lessons with her Aunt Jola, excelling in this area.

Ania also forms a relationship with Lenny Weisz, introduced to him through his brother Robbie who also took piano lessons from Jola, with several twists coming in the latter portion of the novel. The writer ends her story by thanking the reader for spending time with the titular character, and notes that she claims to be a realist with little imagination, fitting for a piece of realistic fiction. Even so, this is an enjoyable sequel that those who enjoyed the first entry will enjoy, although this reviewer found the change in time to come out of nowhere, with a few headscratching moments throughout.

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
