Godspeed by Dan Chabot is many things in one book. There's intrigue, touching but modern romance, anguish, despair, hope and happiness, but above all originality. And it's not often you come across a book which features funerals and obituaries so centrally. It takes a courageous and ingenious author to weave such an excellent story out of these ingredients and Dan Chabot is such an author. His hero, talented journalist Derry Danaher, is a thoroughly likeable guy with an offbeat sense of humour. Through him we get to see what life on a provincial paper is like. Derry, however, lacks a "sole mate" but when the gorgeous Amedee walks into the office one day, it looks like he might have found her. Life is never straightforward, though, but because of Amedee, Derry goes on to make a difference to the lives of a lot of local people in a very generous and unusual way. And he makes a difference to his own life too.

This is one of those books that sticks with you. It's hugely readable and enjoyable, although you'll need to have your hanky at hand, and so appealingly unique. Set in the present and the mid-1970s, it's well paced and peopled by an interesting cast of characters, many of them the usual unusual sort of people you might in everyday life. This story sails along with a good batch of comical characters and a mildly interesting premise that I cannot reveal without giving too much away. It's interesting how everything fits together like a puzzle at the end of the book because sprinkled between the chapters about the main story of Derry's life are mini stories about various funeral ceremonies. The point of these stories comes to light at the end of the book, of course. The author does have talent because the story is clear and has an easy flow about it just like the peaceful lake on the cover of the book.

However, when all is said and done the story is not something I would jump up and down about. There is maybe one tragic part mid-way through the story that really grabs the reader, but beyond that the story is just a notch above being described as dry. While the main character does take up a somewhat interesting quest after this tragic event, the whole story just felt too hum drum. It was as if I had fallen into this "reading coma" where I knew nothing completely exciting or no new incredible revelation would be discovered by the end of the book. I appreciate the author's story about kindness, moving beyond loss, and helping others, but I look for more excitement in my reading then that. The main character's act is a bit questionable in terms of how realistic it would be and the possible negative outcome it could have.

Godspeed is a nice story with nice characters and gives you a nice little glow after reading it. That's all it really measures up too though, being a nice novel. The author has the talent to put together a great story which is evident in the thought and care that was given to this one. I purposely gave you a very short synopsis. I think the reason I such a powerful reaction to the story was because I read it cold, with only scant details of where the story would lead.

It is a love story of an enduring love, told in a ingenious way that really leaves the reader solving a bit of a mystery. Their love was beautiful until it came crashing down around them and I cried right along with Derry as he tried to pick up the pieces of his life and move on. The end of the story brought everything together brilliantly and it all became apparent to me. This is a romance, but don't expect lots of steamy love scenes and angst. They aren't there. The structure of this novel is quite unusual: most of it is the unbelievably saccharine tale of Derry and Amedee's storybook romance, interspersed with the occasional chapter describing the funeral of some random person. The plot shows up about halfway through, adding quite a bit of interest to the characters' journeys. This reads a bit like the author took a bunch of anecdotes about real people, embellished them a little bit, and strung them together into a story. There's no villain or even much conflict to speak of, but the characters are reasonably memorable and the funeral bit is an interesting touch. If you're in the mood for a quiet, pleasant read that won't bring you down, give this a try. If you're looking for a piece of hard-boiled drama, look elsewhere.
