There's a lot going on with this book from the constellations on the cover and the endpapers to the sweet rhymes inside. Lots of detail in the illustrations means that you can interact with this book often and not get bored!

Jeff says

This is only the second book I've reviewed, so I hesitantly give it a 5-star rating. I looked for 4-1/2, but that apparently is not an option. In my opinion it's deserved of a five, though - more than a four. This book, much like the previous book I reviewed ("Take Care of Me from A to Z") is also an ideal book for reading to preschoolers (ages 3-5). The difference is, I can see this book being fun for children up to higher ages as well - maybe as old as 9 or 10... Why?

I like how this book strongly encourages the reader - and hopefully attentive listeners - to dream. Starting with the book's end papers - which feature illustrations of make-believe constellations - and throughout the story's content (both visually and literally), "Sweet Dreams Lullaby" is an excellent book for young children.

Some details I noticed include:

* A wide array of color is used throughout the book. The setting - the various landscapes illustrated - is very creatively developed. The book carefully shifts from day into night and uses colors very appropriately and insightfully.

* The narrator for this story is a bunny rabbit and the other characters are all animals. Why? Why not! I think this adds to the author's intention for the reader to use their imagination. It's obvious this bunny is being nestled into bed by its mother and the fact the book sticks with animals to illustrate its story is perfectly acceptable, fitting and wonderful (in my opinion).

* The writing is poetic - has rhyme ... Although I read this book as a "Picture Book" option - I did find it in the Picture Book section of my local public library - I can't help but comment on the writing as well. I think the writing - and specifically how it rhymes - makes this book a wonderful one to read to children. I can easily picture having a pleasant flow when reading this book to young children.

From cloud watching to frog songs to 'the dandelion breeze', the little rabbit enjoys his/her drift into sleep. The rhyme and cadence are lovely and create fun visual images. The illustrations are clean, colorful and soft. The animals remind me of Richard Scarry's art with a twist of Ed Emberley. If using in a bedtime storytime (or a dim room), be sure to read it ahead of time, as the text is small and a bit hard to read.

This is a sweet, rhyming lullaby to read with your little ones at bedtime. The illustrations have lots of interesting details and they are very soothing and calming. The endpages feature constellations of the various things depicted in the pages and we enjoyed pointing out the things we'd seen.
