It's a resource not just to get you started, but one you'll return to as you continue to improve your programming skills.

While this is really a great book as widely recommended, it has one drawback as a review material: it did not cover all the materials needed for the exam, but if you were using it for the SAS Base, it is perfect. Another thing, though not big, is that it is really not exam oriented even not like a text book. There is not a single questions in the book.

Besides this is really a great book, it explains how to use the software in a such vivid and interesting way. Once you read it, you cannot forget it. The authors write this book in such a passion that you feel you love SAS, too. It is reader-friendly. Each subsection is limited within two pages. No more no less. This makes it easier for you to check something particular or just take a break without waiting too long. But if they have more advanced materials in it, it would be better for me.
