Short dog, Tall giraffe. Quiet rabbit, Loud lion. Page after page, this bright, bold, colorful book explores opposites using commonly known animals. The left page contains one animal; the right page has the second animal hidden under a flap. Readers have a chance to guess what the opposite animal will be and are sometimes surprised with the answer.

Not only is this a “lift the flap” book, but the animals under the flap are often times pop-up animals. We loved this book! It is simple but fun to read and enjoy. The best surprise comes on the very last page where the animal is larger than the book itself!

Children love the way the book shows the opposites. This is not only great for print motivation because it is fun to read, but also great for vocabulary. There are great words, like spiky and smooth, bouncy and still. This might be a good time to talk about being careful with library books since this book is delicate and some of the pages- like the huge elephant fold out at the end may take patience to refold back into the book.

This would be a great picturebook for the 3-4 age range, especially for discussing 'opposites'. It's best as a read-together, as there are fold-outs and pop-outs that do damage pretty easily (half the ones in my library's copy were damaged). But what a fun read together. Even my 7-year-old smiled a bit, though it's outside his age limit.

Bold and attention-catching! I love using this at the end of storytime as the kids are starting to get wiggly and attention is fading. It always pulls them back in! There is lots of room for interaction and questions (i.e. what do you think the opposite of heavy is?) to liven up the experience. I also have taken this book to outreach events, because it is a quick read with a child who stops by the library's booth, but still a wonderful experience for them to see the pop-up pictures up close. I let the children touch and feel the pop-ups gently, which always amazes them! And if the child can't stay for longer than a few seconds, even a few pages of this book will do, since it isn't a chronological story by any means. Simple opposites. Amazing, bold, colorful pop-up illustrations. You can't go wrong!

This book is a ton of fun for little ones. The pages are thick and are designed to be opened up by little hands. The book is arranged so there is one animal listed "Short dog", then on the next page is its opposite "tall giraffe", but to see the giraffe the page has to be opened up. Kids will love to interact with this book. Some of the pages have the animals jumping off the page as the bouncy kangaroo and the fast cheetah. You will want to supervise little ones to make sure they do not harm the pop up photos. Only 2 words per page so keeping a child's attention should not be an issue with this book.
