The Best of Fools is an engaging romance that addresses many of the age old questions about love: Is there such a thing as true love? Is it possible for two people to meet and immediately know they are meant for each other? What does it take for love to survive? Those are only a few that the heroine, Jane Austen, has to ponder as she ventures into adulthood. After introducing the main characters in the prequel novella, No, Not That Jane Austen, Marilyn Grey continues the story of Jane, her best friends Donovan and Autumn, and an attractive Englishman, Alistair, whom she met only once. Although Jane was raised in a loving, supportive family, she has a great deal of mistrust and questions about who she is. She discovered information at a young age that she was adopted and wonders why she was never told about this. After graduation, Jane has two immediate goals - to find her biological mother and pursue her dream of a career in fashion design. With a generous monetary gift from her parents, she immediately begins work on goal two, hiring two seamstresses and opening her own store. Since Jane has never believed in love, nor had a boyfriend, her friends and family encourage her to step out of the box she has closed around herself and open her mind to dating. While Donovan tries to convince Jane to take a chance on love by exploring a connection to Alistair (even though he's back in England and she has no idea how to contact him), everyone else thinks Donovan and Jane have always been meant for each other. Thus, the stage is set.

This is a captivating book about hopes, dreams, relationships, and discovery. Grey has built very real characters that we get to know through their thoughts, emotions, and dialogue. She has included almost every emotion - love, fear, sadness, anger, disappointment, anxiety, surprise - to give insight into her characters. This is how we get to know them and experience these emotions right along with them. I laughed, I cried, I felt things more deeply than I have in a long while. Perhaps this was because the dialogue was so believable, but I rather think it is because Marilyn Grey is a master storyteller. This was my first experience with any of her writings, so I was unaware of what to expect. However, I became engaged from the first and cared about these people who were so real to me as I followed them through triumphs and tragedies, anxious to see how the story would end. In addition to story and character development, Marilyn Grey has a beautiful writing

style that flows easily and is full of quotable remarks about life, love, sacrifice, and determination. Every situation is relevant in today's world and provides valuable life lessons. Grey has a knowledge of art, music, and pop culture that she sprinkles throughout the story to enhance it. Jane loves classical music and Batman! As she struggles through many dilemmas, she often compares her situations to novels by Nicholas Sparks. There were also amazing audio links in the e-book version which I played numerous times - just couldn't get enough! I often found my thoughts returning to this story when I wasn't reading, repeating dialogue that was still on my mind. I was asked to read this book, as well as the prequel: No, Not that Jane Austen, in favor for an honest review.

That. Was. Astounding! In the first couple chapters, I wasn't as hooked as I hoped to be, but when she reached contact with Alistair, that's when I started to enjoy the book even more! But.. I'm jumping too far ahead.

Let's start from the *beginning*! In *No, Not that Jane Austen*, the prequel to *The Best of Fools*, Jane Austen bumps into a very attractive British guy who insists on buying her coffee. Somehow, they end up spending the day together since he missed his flight until he has to go again. Back to England where he, of course, lives. He wrote a note promising to meet her in two/three years at the same place and same time to give her a *proper* kiss.

The Best of Fools begins just a couple weeks after the Prequel, Jane has graduated from high school and received a boat load of money from her parents. What does she do with? Start her own clothing line, love in her own apartment with an oblivious roommate, meet her *birth* mother, travel to the places batman was filmed, and take a plane to the UK and back home. Of course, She spends that boat load not even within a single year. She lasted longer than I would have though..

Jane Austen, *No.. not that Jane Austen*, never understood love. She never felt it with anyone, never been on a date, only kissed one guy, and that was her best friend Donovan, she didn't like being compared to the loving Jane Austen books/movie that she never got to be her and let love in. She was too secure, didn't want to get hurt, heart broken, or let down, especially abandoned. Maybe she took the risk with her clothing line, but falling in love.. that was *too* risky. She doesn't give up, which is something I can admire about her.

When they were finally happy, something... happens. I won't spoil anything because you seriously need to read this book! A few months pass and they're reconnected again, stronger, given the circumstances. I was actually squealing and rocking back and forth in my seat within the last 10-20 chapters because, *oh my goodness!!!* SO. FREAKING. CUTE!

Now let's get to the critiques! I noticed there were a few grammatical and spelling mistakes, but only a few. I overlooked them due to the amazing heart felt and very ready eyed story! Maybe it was just on my ebook version..

The writing? I loved it, it was simple and easy to follow along to. I absolutely loved the graphic clips that Marilyn added, as well as the voicemail audio clips, they were such a cute add for the e-readers! I absolutely adored listening to Alistair.. (*Cool thing was, Marilyn spoke for Janes parts, cool!*) It gave the book a sense of reality and connective-ness, like we get to see a closer look, at least it did to me.

Might I also add how bloody fantastic Jane and Alistair are! They're so much the same, but so different as well. They just dove into their dorky lives and fit perfectly together, both huge fans of Batman! I loved how Jane would talk to herself, so much through the book. *I do that too, so it was quite funny and realistic!* *Awesome touch, Marilyn.* I can't wait for those Novellas you mentioned at the end of this book, I would absolutely love to get a closer look at Jane and Alistair's life, and his recovery. ~~I want my very own Alistair Gladwyn!!~~

Also, on another note, Janes dreams really concerned me, but they always made me laugh, she had some really confusing and out of the blue dreams..

Now, I will talk about what I've highlighted and noted, because there was a lot.. They're not in order, though.

One of my favorite scenes, is in Chapter 39...

I waited. Then turned. "Hey."

He touched my hair again, then moved over to make room for me. "Come here, duck."

That is just so adorable, I couldn't resist highlighting it. She's a cooky girl, and she embraces it, it's so cute how he loves that about her.

Another one of my favorites is in Chapter 47...

Jane is finally visiting Alistair for the first time in England, they're at his place when he gives her a framed

copy of the original Batman comic. Here's her response...

“Alistair.” I ran my fingers over the glass. “I’d kill to open this and smell the pages.”

It reminded me of bibliophiles and their passion for reading, even smelling the pages of the books to get the full effect. She gets us. We get her. *Unite!*

Finally, my last favorite passage from Chapter 61, which is my favorite chapter by far...

There are things you deserve in life, but love isn't one of the . Every time you're given it, it's a gift. That's what Alistair was to me, no matter how much he thought I deserved it... I didn't. And never would. . .

I loved all the Batman references, and that Jane had a *Gotham City* inspired fashion line, and that she found love against all the odds. She especially didn't give up. I envy her, somewhat. She wasn't normal, and she found someone, unexpectedly, that she could finally love back.

The Epilogue is on May 10, 2075, and it's a really sad Epilogue but so amazing. You must read and find out what happens to Jane and Alistair through their journey of life and love. I honestly couldn't put it down when I got halfway through.

Usually, one of my guesses is right. While reading "The Best of Fools", every guess I made about what was to come, didn't happen.
