Some interesting philosophical and religious points are raised in the books, but not very high. Most of the words are about teenagers talking and doing things that teenagers in the US do.

If you were to substitute the word 'black' for the word 'zombie' (and its various synonyms) and set the book in the 1950 (or thereabouts), I guess the story would mostly still work.
