From the summary I was really intrigued by this book. The setup i thought was done quite well. But the pace of the book was very quick. You follow Joff from being a child to an adult within a few chapters. Only getting snapshots into his life only when big changes are happening. This left Joff a little one dimensional for me and didn't help explain his motivations or actions to situations.

I won't go into the plot twist, only to say that I saw them coming and was not really surprised by what happened. Joff's reaction to these twists also didn't feel real as he switched on a dime without a whole lot of conflict.

Once again Neill proves himself a master of atmospheric writing with this latest work, combining science fiction with a bent for horrific alien imagery. The novel borrows from Ender's Game and Halo with young Joff Armstrong, our protagonist. Why does his family insist on living in rural isolation, shunning this hi-tech Earth? Why is Joff being educated with both pragmatic skills and advance theoretical concepts? And when he looks into the night sky, why do more stars vanish into the darkness?

Neill's skill lies in creating an almost dreamlike atmosphere where the reader identifies intensely with the main character and his or her travails, even if some aspects of the worldbuilding are questionable upon later thought. While certain elements such as the decision to select and send Joff on this mission doesn't quite gel, the mystery and actions drives the story forward. The other feature is, of course, the marvelously grotesque alien monstrosities.

There are only two genuine flaws I can find in this book: first off, no constellations? In a book where the

main premise is some eldritch horror destroying the stars, not a single constellation is mentioned. Not a wounded Orion or gored Taurus. The second is the introduction of Callista, where the borrowing from Halo is a bit too overt.

I eagerly await some future installments in the war to keep the stars burning!
