I'm not finished yet, but I'm more than halfway through. I like it, but it's now really bugging me that it seems inconsistent with the first Joshua book. In the first book, Joshua is a grown man and the time setting is the late 1980's. This book is about Joshua's childhood, so in my mind that means it should take place in the 1960's/70's. However, in this book Joshua is introduced to computers and the Internet at school! When he goes home and tells his parents about it, it is apparent they know NOTHING about computers. Joshua's father has to ask him to describe what a computer even IS, which he has a hard time comprehending. As a reader, I find this very inconsistent. I mean we didn't just go from no one knowing what a computer is to full

blown Internet access, AND kids did not have computers OR Internet access in schools prior to the 1980's. Even that is a stretch. I graduated high school in 1989, and our school had a computer lab with very basic computers that could do word processing and not much else, never mind Internet access. No one had even heard of the Internet at that time.

I'm still enjoying the message of the story, but I just find it annoying that it isn't in keeping with the correct time period.

The main character--a version of Jesus who lives and works in the modern world--shows those whom he meets how acts of kindness, patience, and generosity can save the world.
