Portland, OR has kindly granted us yet another promising young author, Vone Savan. Unlike most other new writers, Savan selects Young Adults as the target audience for Soul In Love, which he classifies as a "paranormal romance." However, as an adult reader I find Savan's writing to be just as enjoyable (if not more enjoyable) than a number of the contemporary novels I have read that were aimed for adult readers. This is, I purport, due to the elegant prose that is evenly contrasted with realistic dialogue throughout Savan's novel - and the fact that he **never** underestimates his readers' intelligence. It takes true talent for any writer to develop a plot and storyline that successfully erases the typically ever-present virgules placed between different genres of literature-- this book will surely be appreciated by readers who enjoy practically any genre.

Prior to journeying through the novel I feared that the love story would make the novel fraught or trite. Savan manages to avoid this by integrating wit, humor, and emotion in a way demonstrative of the finest Young Adult literature - reminiscent of writers like Ellen Raskin or Norton Juster. Throughout the work, the characters who are well-developed and likeable escalate the reader's capacity to connect to the story.

After reading the novel I am reminded of the sentiment I felt upon reading a few of my favorite lines from T.S. Eliot's "The Waste Land" - "I could not / Speak, and my eyes failed, I was neither / Living nor dead, and I know nothing, / Looking into the heart of light, the silence. / Oed' und leer das Meer" - a sense not merely of loss, but one of not knowing what comes next. Not hopelessness, but mystery through a continued passion for that which may have ceased to exist in one plain of one's life, but may now be present in some other capacity.

What would you do to stay with the one you love? Soul in Love is a wonderful debut by Vone Savan. I have to admit that I was expecting a sweet, young adult paranormal romance, but was pleasantly surprised by the

depth and chilling nature of this novel. After Amber loses her boyfriend London in a tragic car accident she doesn't know how to move on. Savan's description of heartache and loss is believable and adds to the realism of Amber's experience. When Amber begins to communicate with her dead boyfriend, she sets into motion a series of unexpected, life changing events. *Soul in Love* is a haunting tale of love, remorse, grief, and obsession. Due to certain tragic themes (see "sensitive reader warning" below) this novel may be more suitable for more mature YA readers and adults.

I recommend *Soul in Love* to readers of paranormal romance, paranormal suspense, and especially to fans of young adult fiction with darker themes. *Soul in Love* may appeal to fans of the *Twilight* series by Stephenie Meyer, *Romeo & Juliet*, *The Lovely Bones* by Alice Sebold, and the *Wolves of Mercy Falls* series by Maggie Stiefvater.

This book was given to me by a friend who knows that I like to try out new authors. It took me a long time to start it because it is definitely not the genre that I normally care for at all. However, even though I am not the target audience, I am very glad that I took the time.

First, this book didn't get five stars because it was obviously the author's first novel. Like most new authors, Savan spent a great deal of time describing the settings, characters, and the relationship. I am not sure why a new author's use of adjectives feels clunky, while authors like Stephen King who also spend pages describing small details feel natural. Whatever the reason, it pulls me out of the story so I have to knock off a few points. However, I need to reiterate that this is NOT just him. It is something that I notice about MOST new authors. So if that is the biggest problem that I can find, he's doing well.

Now for the story... The romance formula of love discovered, explored, lost, and regained is tried and true. But Savan took it somewhere new. These were childhood friends who finally decided to date, and having witnessed that dozens of times in my life, I believe that Savan accurately depicted the feelings that hormonal teenagers go through when they believe that they have found the love of their life. Nothing else matters and they get completely wrapped up in each other. Then London dies, and Amber's grief is believable. She loses herself for awhile. That happens. I bought it. That is when Savan's lack of experience stopped pulling me out of the story because I finally cared about the characters. It is good that I finally became engaged in the story because it made what happened next feel plausible.

At this point the story heads down the paranormal path. Amber begins seeing London, feeling him, talking to him. This could be attributed to her grief, and she tries to shrug it off. But his presence is too strong. She again loses herself in her love for him. The reactions of her friends and family who care about her are all believable, even the ones who try to appease her by joining her in her attempts to contact him through the Ouija board.

The Ouija board adds a whole different element to the story that I appreciated. Any time a work of fiction

leads me to want to learn more about something new, I consider it a success. I learned some stuff about the lore of contacting the dead that I wouldn't have bothered exploring on my own. Savan obviously did some research in order to properly use this plot element. As a reader, I respect authors who try to get their facts straight when they could just make something up and have it still be effective.

I don't want to talk about the end of the book because it goes someplace unexpected and I don't want to wreck it for others. While I don't want to throw in too many spoilers, I do want to address the message at the end because it seems to be the main reason that this book is getting poor reviews. So, don't read the next paragraph until after you have read the book, or unless you have already read a review that gave away the ending.

Yes, she kills herself at the end to join her love. That has been thrown out there as the reason that the overall message of the book is bad several times. But as you'll see if you read the book, she was tricked into doing it. It took chapters and chapters of the antagonist whittling away at her drive and destroying her relationships with the living people that she loves in order for her to get to that point. London does not want her to sacrifice her life to be with him. I think that most people who have lost a spouse or boyfriend/girlfriend or counseled another through such a loss would agree that the roller coaster of emotions that this situation would bring on cause people to feel suicidal. I don't feel that acknowledging that as Savan has done is that same thing as advocating it, or calling it the message of the story. The message was that love can overcome all obstacles.

Good job Savan. I'll read your next book.

But sadly, that was the only element I liked about this story.

There were just too many circumstances that just didn't work for me.

Let's start with London's behavior concerning Tristan. A loving, fierce, protective boyfriend is one thing, but to take it to that level is a whole different story and quite frankly I didn't see it fitting with London's personality when alive.

Then there is the ending, which I couldn't convince myself to agree with. There are many different ways to achieve a happily ever after, and as a sap, I wanted it very much for these two, but I wish it could have been handled in a different way.

But most of all, I felt very deceived once we found out who was responsible for Amber's ultimate decision. It made me question everything I read through out the story, wanting the book to be redeemed all in the name of true love, but this particular twist can not be forgiven and therefore destroyed any positive opinion that I may have had. Even though, all is well at the very end, it was the getting there, the real reason, that was most upsetting.

In a nutshell, I don't agree with the message delivered in this book and while the love story is indeed very sweet, I couldn't love this book with the kind of ending we received.

This is a young adult novel of everlasting love. The story features a young couple that simply adores one another, but fate intervenes and Amber's boyfriend London dies. This would normally be the end of the relationship, but somehow it doesn't stop there. The book is listed as paranormal, but it could just as well be spiritual, as we really have no proof of what happens when we die. The grief that Amber displays is so well written that I found myself tearing up along with her despair. Amber's friends and family are all just as wonderfully written.

The drawback for me is in how the story played out and in some of the conversational bits. For me conversation in novels is a tricky thing, you need to cover a lot and still have it sound natural. It wasn't a huge issue throughout, but was more apparent in the last third of the book. The conversations felt forced and unnatural. There seemed to be too many quick easy fixes to the problems at hand, which were unneeded. There were some variances within the story that kept coming up. (The students were celebrating the end of the last day of school before Spring Break, the accident happened that same night, only a week goes by as the funeral is on the following Friday, but Amber's mom is surprised to see her out of bed the following Monday morning, amazed that she is going to school. Amber says she needs to go meet with her teachers for the make-up work. This makes no sense as they weren't in school.) There are a few moments like that throughout and they bother me because they throw off momentum when I have to figure out what is going on

with the timeline. The ending to the story left me entirely disappointed and the characters end up being someone I don't want to know.

Savan does have a way with writing characters and tragedy. He's able to convey emotions and the turmoil one feels when losing a loved one. He convincingly shows what one would do to have one more moment with the one we love.
