Georgina Kincaid is Seattle's resident succubus, and her life has been going from bad to worse lately. At this point in time, she is faced with the marriage of her best friend to the man she loves, and an eerie "siren song" is calling to Georgina, begging her to come into it. Also, amid these disasters, Georgina is still getting used to everyday life with her new roommate, Jerome's sociopathic, nephilim son, Roman. On top of that, a visiting succubus, Simone, is in town and doing everything she can to corrupt Seth and his soul.

When everything gets to be too much, and after a particularly emotional encounter with Roman, Georgina finally gives into the "siren song." She soon realizes that it was just a lure from the Oneroi to get Georgina onto the dream plane. As revenge for Georgina helping the angels capture Nyx again, the Oneroi torture Georgina through her dreams, sometimes showing her truths, sometimes showing her lies, and sometimes showing her a mix of the two.

It is through these dreams that she is able to see the progress her friends make in finding her. And that is how she sees that Simone is impersonating Georgina to get to Seth. Jerome, Carter, and Roman learn a way that they could *try* to save Georgina. And after a particularly bold put-down to "Georgina"/Simone, Seth runs into Jerome and goes with him to help try to rescue Georgina from the Oneroi.

Impossibly, Seth is able to reach Georgina through all the different souls and dreams, is able to save her. When she comes out, she doesn't remember anything about her life as Georgina but it eventually starts coming back to her. After sleeping for three days, she now remembers everything.

A little while later, Maddie comes over in tears saying that Seth broke off their engagement. And that he has disappeared. After brining Maddie over to Doug's house, Georgina goes over to Seth's brother's house. They don't know where he is either. As she is leaving, Brandy tells Georgina that Andrea, Seth's sister-in-law, has cancer. Upon hearing this, Georgina goes to Jerome and calls in the favor that he owes her: Send her to Seth and give her three days with him. Four hours later, when he has found Seth, Jerome sends her to Mexico. She finds Seth on the beach and, despite Seth's declaration that he wasn't returning to Seattle, they fall back into the relaxed relationship they had while they were dating. In the heat of passion, they start to get into sex, but Georgina pulls back. She's confused and still doesn't want to hurt him. That night, while Seth is sleeping, Georgina realizes that she can't see this cynical, pessimistic side to Seth and leaves, leaving a note saying that she loves him too much to stay.

The next day, after work, Georgina gets a call from Erik, and due to the violent nature of the call, she speeds over to his shop. Where she finds the inside of the store destroyed, the windows broken, and Erik, bloody and broken, behind the counter. Georgina does everything she can to save him but they both know that it's too late. He entreats her for a kiss, giving him a painless death as she sucks the rest of his soul out of him. Before he dies, though, he tells her something shocking: There is nothing wrong with her contract, but there are *two* contracts, and he makes her promise to find the second one.

After finding no sympathy from Jerome, she goes home, where Roman has more bad news for her. The first thing is a letter from Seth saying that she made him realize that he needed to stop putting himself first and focus on his family, because they need him right now, and that he had returned to Seattle. The second was a magazine. A magazine in which there was a picture of her and Seth kissing on the beach, the day after he broke up with Maddie. When she goes into the bookstore the next day, all her coworkers treated her with disdain and antipathy, and she has a confrontation with Maddie, during which Georgina reveals that she and Seth had dated before he started dating Maddie. After that encounter, she feels beaten down. Then Carter appears and, though he won't tell her what's up with the two contracts, he instills the hope in her that anything is possible.

Later that night, with Carter's words still ringing in her ears, Georgina makes a decision. Seth would give anything to be with her and so she could do no less for him. That decision made, she goes over to Seth's condo and she tells him her revelation and that she'll never leave him again. They finally have sex while she is a succubus and he tells her that the side effects were worth the experience. As he drifts to sleep, he calls Georgina by her human name, leaving her with more questions and worries than answers and comforts.

As always, I was thoroughly entertained by Georgina. While, admittedly, she had a bad time of it for most of the book, that did not lessen Georgina's sarcasm, wit, and charm. I enjoyed seeing her relationships with those around her grow, or decline as it were, throughout the book, particularly her relationship with Roman and Seth. As per usual, Georgina was faced with many obstacles in this book, and I admired her perseverance and determination to find answers.

I discovered as a result of reading Succubus Heat that I have a thing for Roman, the sociopathic nephilim. So, I enjoyed getting to see quite a bit of him in this book. Like with Georgina's relationships, I enjoyed seeing Roman grow from dispassionate roommate into a caring, considerate friend who would still risk it all just to be with the woman he loves. I hurt for him in the end when Georgina went to Seth, but I knew all along that it wasn't meant to be with her and Roman, and I really wouldn't have had it any other way.

Seth, oh Seth. I continue to love Seth and his devotion to those he loves, but I was also a little disappointed alongside Georgina to see that he initially ran away from his problems. However, that hasn't affected my overall opinion of him and the fact that he ultimately returned certainly helped the situation. With regards to Seth, though, I am thoroughly convinced that he is Kyriakos reincarnated. Certain comments that he made certainly support the theory, and his calling Georgina by her human name drives the theory home for me, if nothing else. That being said, I am really intrigued by how that is going to affect Georgina's future.

As I finished this book, I think my main feeling was total apathy. Aside from a few parts, I thought it was capital B boring. I read all of the scenes while Georgina was trapped in the dream world and I just didn't care about any of it. The end was a little bit better, but not good enough for me to give this any more than 3 stars...and it might actually be more like 2 1/2. I'd definitely say it was my least favorite in the series to date.

I think a BIG part of my issue with this book is that I really can't stand Seth anymore. I liked him in the first two books, but it's been steadily downhill from there. Aside from the fact that he's a cheating bastard, he's also a coward and I just can't respect him. My dislike of him started when he slept with Maddie right after breaking up with Georgina - which he basically did because he couldn't have sex with her - and got worse when he started dating Maddie, despite knowing that he'd be constantly throwing the relationship in Georgina's face. Of course next he cheats on Maddie with Georgina, and *then* he proposes to Maddie out of guilt instead of just 'fessing up like a man. If he would've told her about the affair and broken up with her, I would've at least respected that. I was never cool with the fact that he was marrying her just because he felt bad about being unfaithful. In the end, calling off the wedding was the right thing to do because it wasn't fair to Maddie to marry her when he didn't love her in that way. I felt terrible for Maddie, though, especially because I believe that if she had known that Georgina and Seth had dated (I still don't understand why Georgina felt they had to hide their relationship in the first place), she would have never started dating Seth. She just doesn't seem the type to go after her friend's ex-boyfriend. And then yet another strike against Seth - and Georgina, too, actually - was that they were all over each other right after his break-up with Maddie. Georgina certainly hadn't felt good when she found out that Seth had did the same thing to her, but she didn't hesitate to pounce on the guy as soon as she was able. Meh. Even though I still like Georgina, my opinion of her dropped a bit this book. She just came off like a huge hypocrite and I got tired of her constant whining. Yeah, you've lead a miserable existence, but you brought it on yourself because you couldn't control your baser instincts. It's been a couple thousand years. GET OVER IT.

Right now it feels like the only characters I still have any real love for are Carter and Roman. Weird. I still want Georgina to get her HEA, but I feel like she and Seth have a really toxic relationship and I know I'll be disappointed if they wind up together in the last book. I'm glad the next book will be the last, since I can only see the series degenerating further from here. In fact, I think with better plotting, Mead could have made this book the finale. Ah, well. I'm still going to read the sixth book because I've invested the time and effort into reading the others and for the most part I've enjoyed them, but I can't really say that I'm looking forward to it.

I enjoyed the parts about Georgina's past and when she got to spy on her friends, but some of the rehashed stories were a tad boring. I understand the reasons why they were there but when I got to that part I wanted it to be over sooner than it was.

And a thing that really bothers me is how slow Georgina can be sometimes. A main conflict of the story, which is found on the back of the book and in the synopsis on this site so not a spoiler, is that a new succubus is in town and she has her eye on Seth. What I didn't get was why Georgina, or even one of Georgina's friends, didn't warn Seth about the succubus. He knows about the demons and angels and lesser immortals so why didn't someone clue him in? All she had to do was say, "stop flirting with the succubus stupid," and Seth would have stayed away from the beginning. Maybe it was a plot device, I don't know. But it just didn't make a whole lot of sense and seemed really dumb on Georgina's part.

As for the other characters in this story, I love Carter and I wish he could be a bigger part of her life than he is, same with Roman. I also wish the side characters would get more time in the overall story, her friends are just too much fun and are definitely underused. Jerome is kind of getting on my nerves with how uncaring and overbearing he can be at times, but I suppose that's his nature.

**I liked this book but it still left me with an unresolved feeling.** It's actually pretty apt that Georgina comments that her life is going around in circles, because that's exactly what's happening with these books. I was hoping with those remarks that Mead was going to bring about some sort of conclusion but things are left rather ... ambiguous.

It's nice to see a good dose of scenes letting me know Georgina a little better instead of trying to keep my interest in a mystery that's not even a mystery at all.

"Succubus Shadows" is, I think, my least favorite Georgina Kincaid book to date. It's not really bad, but compared to previous installments it is rather dull, it is not a supernatural mystery, as previous installments were, but supernatural chick lit/melodrama.

Georgina is depressed and down most of the time. She is compelled to help Maddie to plan her wedding with Seth, the man she loves. On top of it, a new visiting succubus in town is trying to seduce Seth and taint his soul even more. Even her surprisingly compassionate, albeit marginally psychotic, but oh so sexy, roommate Roman can't cheer her up. Whenever Georgina is at her lowest, strange things start happening to her - she loses her memory, she sleepwalks, she is drawn to something, something unearthly, a realm of dreams. At some point Georgina is too weak and distraught to resist the pull and finally succumbs to this dream world, only to be tortured by the dreams of her sinful past.

My main qualm with "Succubus Shadows" is that I can tell it was lazily written, that Richelle didn't quite have time to think this book through properly. Whenever she starts filling her books with memories and flashbacks, whenever her characters acquire magical abilities of watching the events from other people's POV, I know, the author was too lazy or rushed to come up with a better idea of achieving the same ending, but without cheap plot devices. (For more examples of similar rushed plotting, see Blood Promise - the book where VA jumped the shark IMO).

The first half of the story was on par with previous books. It was dynamic and funny wherever G's gang was involved. But the moment our succubus was consumed by the dream world, the story slowed down. Georgina's dreams of the past were redundant, we've encountered her experiences with good men before, and we already know that it's the same vicious cycle, no need to pound on it more IMO (plus, some of Georgina's memories were copied and pasted from Mead's previously published, obscure short story). Her other trips into her present time and involving her friends were more of a plot device to show us, readers, how the search for her was progressing. These poor plot devices sucked all mystery out of the book.

The previous book left me full of angst and hate for both Seth and Maddie, and with concern for Seth's darkened soul. This installment never built upon this drama. The characters I despised in "Succubus Heat" were too easily redeemed, their discretions forgotten and difficulties smoothed out.

And finally, the huge clues given in this book are VERY obvious. It seems only Georgina doesn't know how the things will turn out in the end.

Overall, "Succubus Shadows" is a decent book, if you compare it to others in urban fantasy genre. It is a must-read for Georgina fans and a good primer for the finale. But if compared to some previous succubus stories, it lacks excitement, mystery and drama, it is a tad obvious and predictable. It could have been much better if the author put a bit more effort into it.
