The Hidden Kingdom: The Nocturnals, is the 4th book in a fun fantasy series for middle-grade readers. Starring Dawn the fox, Tobin the pangolin, and Bismark the sugar glider, it's a story that will have kids laughing along with their adventures.

The animals in the Hidden Kingdom are in trouble when water vanishes from the valley, and there may be evil spirits lurking in the forest. Dawn, Tobin and Bismark are friends in the Nocturnal Brigade, and they are on a quest to save the Kingdom. Told in short chapters with charming, pencil-drawn character illustrations - the adventure unfolds as they work together to solve the mystery.

Though this is the 4th in a series, this story can easily stand on its own. My children, ages 8 and 9, have not read the previous books, and were easily able to understand & enjoy The Nocturnals. The short chapters made for a good read-aloud for us together, and they both still like seeing illustrations even in chapter books. As a parent, I liked the emphasis in the story on friend's working together, and loved the addition of the pangolin and sugar-glider - two unique animals that I don't remember ever reading a fictional story about (and the kids loved them too).

We were pleased to receive an ARC via a Goodreads Giveaway, and happy to leave a review. My kids have already asked about other books in the series, so I'll be seeking them out to add to our home library!

After reading the first three novels in the series, my children could not wait to see what The Hidden Kingdom had in store. We read the novel out loud as a family, everyone participated, and it was easy to do so- the animals in this novel are so lively! What I liked most about this book was that it went beyond the

easy 'teamwork and friendship' narrative that most middle grade novels default to. Although the Brigade surely demonstrated the difficulties and benefits of both teamwork and friendship, Hecht addresses tougher issues. SPOILER- the villains in this novel are bad because they feel excluded. Getting to the root of bullying and deciphering how to handle those who bully can be difficult to talk about with your kids. Yet, Hecht supplies a narrative that is tailored to your child's imagination and crafts an understanding of these topics. It has started an important dialogue between my kids and me about the harder parts of growing up. All around, this series is a win for the family and we can't wait to see what's next.

Dawn, a fox; Tobin, a pangolin; and Bismark, an energetic sugar glider are all friends who have adventures. When their habitat is threatened by severe drought, they make their way to where they think a waterhole should be. Along the way, they run into Cora, a wombat who is severely weakened by hydration. Tobin is rather smitten with Cora, so the group takes her with them. Along the way, they run into all manner of trouble, including a patch of quick sand that almost swallows Bismark and a tree that attacks them! When they eventually find water, they must battle King Kami, the Ruler of the Veiled Creatures. Kami's army of bugs attacks our friends in order to get noticed. Will the intrepid group be able to obtain water and fend off the creatures in order to survive?

This fourth installment in the illustrated Nocturals series has moments of humor, suspense, and even romance. Bismark is a quirky character who sprinkles both French and Spanish into his conversation, and is constantly jumping to conclusion that frequently get the group into predicaments. The quest for water is a series one, and the dangers the group faces along the way are reflective of the difficult life of many wild creatures. In addition to Tobin's sweet attachment to Cora, we have Bismark's Pepe le Pew like infatuation with Dawn, the strong and quiet fox who holds the group together.

The pictures, which will be in four colors in the finished book, are scattered about, and readers who enjoy both Hunter's Warrior series and notebook novels like Wimpy Kid will appreciate the blend of these two elements.

This would be a good STEM connections book if there were a little more about the animals. For example, the information about the pangolin was very interesting, especially its skunk-like stink leaving abilities, but more would have been helpful. I haven't read the other three books, so was a bit confused at where the animals lived. My best guess is Australia. A publisher website devoted to the series, Nocturnalsworld.com, has more information.

The pictures in this were reminiscent of 1980s illustrations, and the sugar glider didn't seem in proportion to the other animals. This was a rather odd title, and the lack of information about the animals' habitat was confusing. It's nice that the author runs writing programs in New York City, but I'm failing to see the appeal that this title would have for middle grade readers.

I had a great time reading The Hidden Kingdom with my niece. We have read the whole series together and with each new book, we learn more about wacky animals and have fun researching them online. (Pangolin anyone?) In this adventure, the animals in the valley start to hear strange voices, trip on the crumbling ground beneath them and their water disappears! The Nocturnal Brigade—Dawn, Tobin, and Bismark—assume the forest is under an evil spell. SPOILER ALERT: It's a group of veiled creatures—a chameleon, stick bugs, leaf bugs, and other assorted camouflaged insects—that are causing the problems because they want the valley's recognition for their hard work in preventing a drought. Yep—another lesson learned with The Nocturnal Brigade! And one my niece and I can talk about without being too serious. Two thumbs up here!

In their first appearance (*The Mysterious Abductions*), three very different animals - Tobin the pangolin, Bismarck the sugar glider, and Dawn the fox- work together to save themselves from a hungry snake on the very first night they meet. That success leads to the formation of the Nocturnal Brigade, with the three new friends ready to help others. Now in their fourth adventure, they are up against a challenge that seems insurmountable. How can a few animals find a way to help all the creatures they know survive a drought? Bismarck's beloved pomelos are scrawny and withered, the watering holes are all drying up, and everyone feels weak and ill. The Brigade barely has the strength to investigate the odd things that are occurring in their valley. There are strange high-pitched noises, sometimes there are faint voices but no one is there, Cora (the wombat) has her den caved in by something. Weirdest of all, it seems the very sticks and plants have come alive to carry off what little water there is and keep the friends from finding it. How can that be possible?

The Nocturnals features a wide variety of nocturnal animals - foxes, sugar gliders, pangolins, wombats, chameleons, wallabies, bilbies, and bandicoots. Bismarck, the sugar glider, continues with his antics such as flirting with Dawn, bossing everyone else around when there is work involved, and bragging about his brave exploits (which are greatly exaggerated). Tobin gets blamed for any odd odors or squeaky noises due to the pangolin's habit of releasing gas when agitated or frightened. And Dawn is still the leader of the group with her wisdom and courage. Together they face everything from quicksand to tumbleweed attacks in their efforts to find water and save the valley's inhabitants.

Readers who enjoy animal adventures should try *The Nocturnals*, if they haven't already done so. The mixture of mystery, humor, and friendship is a wonderful combination. There is a website for readers and educators with plenty of resources at <https://www.nocturnalsworld.com/>.

My children love animals and this is just the series that allows them to learn about new ones! This time the Brigade faces an unseen foe that is draining the forest's water and causing panic. As we learn more about pangolins, sugar gliders, and red foxes- the main trio of the Nocturnal Brigade; we also unveil the creatures often forgotten. The use of unique animals is what originally drew us into the series, but we've stayed because the plots are so much fun. For Spring Break, the publishing company - I think it's Fabled Films(?) - put out a packet of materials that worked alongside the series. We used word games, made songs, created masks of my children's favorite characters, and even completed a science project. I cannot recommend this series enough. My children view reading differently than they used to - they find it fun. They are finally able to truly visualize, understand, and empathize with the characters- probably in part because of the engaging activities surrounding the novel. Overall, each book in The Nocturnals series has held its own and The Hidden Kingdom is no different. Start this series, or just begin from here, I am sure your kids will love it.
