I received this book for free from a Goodreads giveaway. I don't believe that that affected my opinion of it, but felt I should point that out, just in case ...

At first glance, I wasn't sure what to make of this book. Based on the cover, I was expecting some compendium of esoteric facts and allegedly true tales of real hauntings and/or mysterious creatures and the like. But, reading the back cover copy, I discovered that it was fiction, short stories dealing with the supernatural and the bizarre. And what a collection of writers: Poe, Lovecraft, Oscar Wilde, Bram Stoker, Arthur Machen, R.W. Chambers, and more! I think what sealed the deal for me was Lord Dunsany, whose work I've found, over the years, is always worth reading.

Judika Illes has done a remarkable job of curating this collection. The lineup is a pleasing mix of familiar and unfamiliar names, and, in the case of the former at least, she's chosen lesser known tales that only hardcore fans of those writers will likely have encountered before--okay, yes, "The Monkey's Paw," is an exception, but, as she points out in her introduction, while many people may be familiar with the general story, comparatively few have actually read the original. Her brief introductions to each story are interesting and highly informative--I had no idea, for instance, that Algernon Blackwood had not only worked as an artist's model, but had actually posed for a painting by Robert W. Chambers (both writers have stories in this book.)

Overall, this is an excellent anthology of classic horror tales. It lends itself very well to being read aloud by flickering candlelight. While I was previously familiar with the work of a few of these writers, I can see that I need to seek out books by quite a few more ... Highly recommended!
