I absolutely loved this book! I admit I didn't read the first in the series, I didn't know there was a first book. I loved how detailed the book was, it had me wanting more and I could hardly put the book down. The romance wasn't the main focus and for me, I loved that. It had me on the edge of my seat and I kept telling myself once I finished this chapter I'm going straight to bed, but then I end up reading two more.

The reason this is not a five star for me is because there were a few things that was different than what was stated before. I was a bit confused, I don't want to give it away, but it's in the beginning, you just have to remember it when you read further into the book.

I won this book through Goodreads. Free books are always good, right? Not in this case.

The prolog had no real bearing on story except in a very general way, reading more like the author expressing her take on big business that setting the stage.

I had a hard time buying the supra-national organization with unlimited resources and power assisting Lou Donovan. I had a harder time buying that members of this organization (Sanguinostri) all seemed to have beyond normal abilities or talents – aging slower but healing faster than normal people, able to regenerate body parts, supremely intelligent and rich, and superpowers like mind reading and mind control. I also never got a clear handle on whether Lou was or wasn't a member of the Sanguinostri. She had a title and leadership position in the organization yet still had to undergo something called a 'turning' to be a member. Since this is the second novel in the series, perhaps Corcoran explained this more thoroughly in the first one. That left those of us who haven't read it at a bit of a loss.

Lou is constantly caught off-guard by people walking up to her. That is *not* realistic. Cops are always hyper-aware of what is going on around them.

Because Corcoran writes from an omniscient POV, every scene is rife with 'head-hopping' as she reveals each character's thoughts. This kept me distant from all the characters, making it hard for me to connect with any of them. I never felt as if I was in a character's head, experiencing what he or she experienced, but was watching it all from the outside.

The climax comes almost 50 pages before the end of the book – too soon – and isn't much of a climax at all. There's no real tension in it and it's over too fast and too neat. Everything after that is wrap-up and it goes on too long.

Corcoran's writing style seems to hover around the middle grade/teen level which made the story read somewhat 'childish' at times. The book is rife with, capitalization flubs, words out of order, punctuation

errors, missing words, and wrong words. When someone is affected by something, Ms. Corcoran, they are *fazed* not *phased*. Awkward sentences that require two, three, and sometimes four readings to understand are everywhere. And the odd spacing on many pages says whoever printed it, did it directly from a Word document with 'Widows and Orphans Control' still turned on.

The only plus in this book is some (but not enough) of the dialog between characters rings true. The easy, teasing banter between friends and the cop to witness question and answer exchanges are on the money.

The basic plot line – three men found beheaded in a house stripped of everything that wasn't nailed down leading Lou to heroin and blood (yes, blood) smuggling cartels – was strong enough to stand on its own and would have made a terrific story without the 'woo-woo' element, with Lou and her police cohorts solving the crime on their own instead of through supra-natural resources no normal police detective has. A thorough proofreading would have helped, too.

So why, if I found so much wrong with this book, did I keep on reading it? Like watching a car crash happen to see how bad it gets, I read on to see how far out there Corcoran went. The answer: far enough that the story ceased to be a true mystery.

If you like your mysteries realistic, this isn't the book for you.

Could use some extra editing, some sentences were off and words were capitalized that weren't suppose to be. Lou's life seems to be perfect with no conflict whatsoever. I feel too perfect. Lou never gets angry and when she does, someone tells her about how good her life is and she feels better within a minute.

Overall, this was a good mystery but the characters don't seem to be developing and some conversations are just too perfect with no conflict. I would recommend reading this if you have the time, but the first one was the best.

Lou is out recovering. In the meantime, Vinny is getting ready to work a desk job since his wife is expecting a baby. But he is not going to let just anyone work with Lou. No one seems like a match until he Dillion walks in. Vinny takes Dillion to a triple homicide where the bodies are found in a mansion. When Lou hears about the murders and the lack of clues she jumps in. Using her role as Principate for the Sanguinostri, Lou looks into the murders. Are they really part of the Columbian drug cartel or is there more to this case?

Lou can't help but run toward a mysterious murder that seems to have a serious lack of clues. Being Principate she uses that role to help fill in the cracks of this case. Dillion seems way to perfect for the role I kept waiting for the other shoe to drop.
